PROGRAM: JOHN deCSEPEL previewed today's speaker, **Patrick Decker**, CEO of Xylem, Inc. GEORGE UBOGY announced that next week **Norman Roth**, President of Greenwich Hospital, will describe current operations and the latest innovations at the institution.

TODAY'S SPEAKER: Patrick Decker, a resident of Old Greenwich, is CEO of Xylem Inc., the largest publicly traded water-technology company in the country, located on King Street in Rye Brook, NY. With 13,000 employees, it enables customers in more than 150 countries to transport, treat, test and efficiently use water in public utility, residential, commercial, and industrial settings. Peter described the difficult regulatory, demographic, and infrastructure challenges facing societies around the world in the availability, quality, access and use of water. E.g., access to and quality of water is the #1 policy issue in China, where technological solutions are being applied to enable the reuse of industrial waste water. Water from 7 reservoirs feed the demand for 1 billion gallons per day in New York City; his company has installed systems to monitor the

quality of the water and reservoir levels. He described a public-private partnership Xylem supports, Watermark, whereby employees volunteer to install systems that provide water to schools and communities in undeveloped areas of places like Brazil, India, Peru, and China. Lots of discussion flowed during the Q&A session.
