TODAY'S SPEAKER

JERRY POLLACK stated the main speaker was Mark Pazniokas, Capitol Bureau Chief of the CT Mirror. Prior to Mark's presentation, Bruce Putterman, CEO/Publisher of the CT Mirror, made an opening comment. Stating, "The Connecticut Mirror is a nonprofit, non-partisan, independent online publisher of news, opinion, and data covering policy, government, and politics in Connecticut."

Mark Pazniokas opened his remarks by relating a question from a Japanese tourist, "Is Connecticut blue or red?" Mark found it difficult to answer because Connecticut has a political identity crisis. From 2008 to 2016 Republicans were irrelevant, keeping only 37 seats to the Democrats 72 in 2016.

There is tension in the state with dissatisfaction in state taxes, an unpopular governor and a desire for change. The current Republican candidate for governor, Bob Stefanowski, once a Republican, then a Democrat, then back to Republican illustrates the turmoil in politics.

The Democratic candidate, Ned Lamont, like his opponent, wants to step away from public financing. The allowable contribution to candidates is \$3,500. The hazy area regarding political contributions is the funding that is not direct but is allowed as speech. These "end runs" only contribute to the voter's disillusion.

The Q & A following Mr. Pazniokas' presentation produced some interesting items: Despite Governor Malloy's disapproval rating by 80% of voters, he improved criminal justice and ended homelessness.

Unfunded pension liability is Connecticut's biggest fiscal problem.

Connecticut has recovered most private sector jobs lost in 2008.

Advertising no longer supports periodicals. The prediction is that newspapers will no longer exist in five years.

Voters respond to where they get their news. Young people have no idea as to what media to trust for news. Rumors are heard and believed to be news.

Mr. Pazniokas displayed his timely knowledge of candidates in the coming election and conditions in the state capitol.
