Jason Oliver Chang Ph.D.

"Stages of U.S. Immigration History: from Colony to Empire"



Our nation's immigration history begins with the period of British colonization, before the birth of the republic in the late-eighteenth century. Stretching our historical vantage point to include this earlier foundational period is crucial to questioning American myths of immigration history that suggest the U.S. welcomes all and is a free, open, society where anyone can make it.

Tracing the different ways that migration, conquest, settlement, and exclusion have developed helps to show how this mythology emerged during WWII and the Cold War. As American ideologies of immigration evolved, concepts of immigration with regard to

citizenship, race, and labor were transformed. A spirit of U.S. nationalism fostered domestic and global projects related to capitalist development and empire-building.

Reflecting on this deep history, Professor Chang provides a view on today's immigration debates as promulgated by the current and recent government administrations.

Jason Chang is an Associate Professor of History and Asian American Studies at the University of Connecticut. He is also Director of UCONN's Asian and Asian American Studies Institute. After earning his Ph.D. from the Department of Ethnic Studies at the University of California at Berkeley in 2010, he lectured in Asian American and Latin American history at the University of Texas at Austin. He is currently teaching courses at UCONN in comparative ethnic studies, with an emphasis on the Pacific and western hemisphere.

His first book, *Chino: Racial Transformation of the Chinese in Mexico, 1880-1940* (submitted for review), analyzes the regional histories of Chinese migration and integration in Mexican society to show how the racial image of the Chinese shifted over the course of the 1910 revolution and subsequent reconstruction.
