“Tales of a Greenwich Reporter on the Front Lines”



The role and responsibility of the media in today’s 24-hour news cycle are more important than ever. But what is it like to be a local reporter in an age of accusations of fake news and violent threats against members of the media? Greenwich Time reporter Ken Borsuk will discuss what being a member of a local newspaper means today, explain what goes into decisions about what stories to print, and the state of modern reporting and news coverage. Greenwich has changed through the last two decades and coverage itself has dramatically shifted at a time when more and more news is consumed digitally and there is less of a reliance on the classic newspaper. The news landscape faces an uncertain and unpredictable future. But what does that mean for local coverage about the kind of issues that hit closest to home for Greenwich residents?

Ken Borsuk has more than 18 years of experience covering Greenwich’s local beats, first as a reporter and then editor of the Greenwich Post, and since 2015 as a staff reporter for *Greenwich Time*. Borsuk has covered local government, working through the first selectman administrations of Lolly Prince, Richard Bergstresser, Jim Lash and now Peter Tesei as well as too many members of the Board of Estimate and Taxation, Planning and Zoning Commission and the Board of Education to count. He has gone through consolidations, layoffs, a shift from weekly news coverage to daily news coverage and has watched as the anger toward the media has grown. A native of New York, Ken is a graduate of Ithaca College and has been working in journalism for 19 years. [Ken’s comments do not necessarily represent the opinions of Hearst Media, Inc.]
