President **MICHAEL AMBROSINO** started the meeting at 9:45, and **JOHN STANKUNAS** led the Pledge of Allegiance. **LEN CARUSI** shared a video of the "Star-Spangled Banner" sung by the Melody Men at Citifield.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

MICHAEL reminded all that membership meetings during the month of January will be held over Zoom. Indoor tennis will continue; ANDY HOLMES asks members to wear masks when not on the court. All in-person card games are canceled at The Woman's Club. The Nominating Committee will be meeting over the next couple of months to prepare a slate of officers and committee chairmen; please consider accepting a position if asked by the committee. FRED WU is the scribe today. SAM MARASSO is the mentor today. ARNOLD GORDON will take over the meeting toward the end, when MICHAEL needs to leave for an appointment.

Corresponding Secretary **ARNOLD GORDON** led a pre-meeting discussion about the covid situation. **ARNOLD** asked if members were able to obtain the free covid test kits and masks and commented on the horrendous traffic bottlenecks at both the Senior Center and Grass Island. Surely, they could have planned it better and even used other locations. With more curiosity, he asked if any members have had a fourth covid mRNA vaccine shot, something

that might be in the cards soon. The differences between flu and covid were discussed, as recently the symptoms have become more similar. Nevertheless, she will give her talk today on Zoom. **ARNOLD** announced next week's speaker, David Yermack, Professor of Finance and Business Transformation at NYU Stern School of Business, who will give a talk entitled "Overview of Cryptocurrencies: The Basics."

Before delivering the Walkers report, **TAD LARRABEE** talked about his experience with solar panels. "We have an all-electric house and have been producing most of our electricity from solar panels since January 2019. We are very happy with the results! Beyond the

environmental benefits, one element that is usually overlooked is the return on investment. When we started, investment returns on bonds were very low and remain so today. In spite of that, many of us have a portion of our retirement investments in bonds to lower our risk. In our case, one investment alternative was solar panels where our investment return is roughly nine percent. As a kicker, if electricity costs increase (which has happened), our effective rate of return increases without a concurrent reduction in the "face value" of the bond-equivalent, something that ordinary bonds can't provide. Furthermore, real estate agents have indicated that the resale value of our home increased by more than twice the net cost of our investment in solar energy, and it does <u>not</u> increase our tax assessment. Overall, it has been one of our better investment decisions outside the recent stock market. Walkers: TAD reported that on Thursday morning, December 23rd, the RMA Walkers met at the Greenwich YWCA parking lot and walked through various neighborhoods down to Long Island Sound at the bottom of Steamboat Road and returned via Greenwich Avenue. Then on Thursday morning, December 30th, we met at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Riverside, and again walked down to Long Island Sound through some interesting neighborhoods including Harbor Point where we "trespassed" out-of-season to Elias Point where we had a great view of Greenwich Point and the Sound. We also found some of the remains of the old mansion and grounds that is the current site of the Harbor Point neighborhood.

Both times we had somewhat questionable weather predictions, but the weather gods looked favorably on us and we had two very nice walks. Each time we had close to a dozen walkers and many good, though sometimes "odd," conversations. You had to be there!

Platform Tennis: JIM DEAN reported that there were nine players at paddle tennis yesterday.

Volunteer Hours: JIM BUTLER noted that volunteer groups are shrinking, and it is getting difficult to continue. He suggested each week at this meeting a group leader present what they do, and try to attract additional volunteers.

SPEAKER PROGRAM

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HORST TEBBE introduced Dr. Mélisse Brunet, who is currently a finalist for the position of Music Director of the Greenwich Symphony Orchestra. A French conductor, Ms. Brunet is the Music Director of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Philharmonic, an orchestra made up of freelance musicians from the NYC and Philadelphia areas. A protégée of Pierre Boulez, she is one of the twelve conductors selected for the first Conducting Competition La Maestra. Ms. Brunet was one of the six conductors selected for the 2018 Bruno Walter National Conductor Preview, chosen for their "experience, talent, leadership potential, and commitment to a career in service to American orchestras." In 2017, she was one of six conductors chosen for the international Hart Institute for Women Conductors at the Dallas Opera, selected from 161 applicants from 33 countries. A native of Paris, Ms. Brunet began her studies on the cello, and also learned to play the trumpet, French horn, and piano. She holds diplomas from the Paris Conservatory and the Université la Sorbonne, as well as a Professional Studies diploma from the Cleveland Institute of Music and a doctorate in conducting from the University of Michigan.

HORST conducted the interview of Mélisse using questions of his own, supplemented by those originally posed by **GEORGE UBOGY** and **STEVE BOIES**, as well as some coming from the Zoom audience via the chat window.

Mélisse said that her interest in classical music began when she was a young child, because in France just about every town has a school of music available at low cost. She originally wanted to learn to play drums, but in light of her parents' opposition, she chose the cello. At some point after playing the cello in school orchestras, she realized that she was bored playing a piece by the great Mozart. But she also realized that the responsibility for her boredom was not with Mozart, but with how the orchestra was being conducted. This was the start of her interest in conducting.

Several questions were asked about her background growing up in Paris, studying at the best music conservatories in France, as well as the French style of music education. She revealed that the Paris Conservatory is not only extremely competitive, but competitive in a negative way, implying that it caused personal enmities and emotional stress. In one fascinating anecdote, she described the final examination in a counterpoint class, which required the student to be sequestered alone in a room for 17 hours with a piano (locked until the start of the test!) to compose a piece of contrapuntal music.

Asked about coming to the United States, Mélisse said that she was very fortunate to have been invited to attend an academic program at the Cleveland Institute of Music. At that point she had studied music in France for many years, and was ready for a change. All she knew of the US was the stereotypes depicted in the French media. When she arrived in Cleveland in 2010, she was shocked by the deep snow, but also by the warmth of the people she met there. She says that was quickly accepted by those she met, and has not felt any desire to return to France, aside from professional engagements there. Mélisse also said that at the time, French orchestras tended to prefer non-French music directors, and that conducting was very much a male-dominated discipline.

HORST asked Mélisse how she would choose programs for the Greenwich Symphony, and how she would get more young people interested in classical concerts. Mélisse explained that this is a complex undertaking, and requires her to get to know the audience. She can learn about her audience from the musicians, but also by gauging the audience reaction to her selections. Her goal is both to please and challenge the audience, exposing them to something unfamiliar that they will appreciate. As for attracting youth, she believes that education programs are vital because when young children are exposed to classical music, at some point in their lives their appreciation will grow. Even if this takes many years, at least the youth of today are more likely to become concert-going seniors of tomorrow, if they have had the early music education.

When asked about conducting technique and preparation, Mélisse described several ways in which she studies a new piece. She mentioned analysis of harmony, form, orchestration, and supplementary research into the cultural life and times of the composer. Learning about the important artistic trends of the day gives her insights into the intent of the composer. As for technique, Mélisse said that she does not always use a baton when she conducts. She pointed out that a baton is good because it is very visible to the musicians, especially in a large orchestra where some of the musicians are distant. A baton also helps by magnifying small movements of her hand. However, when not using a baton she can be more expressive with her fingers and gestures. She showed videos of performances of Ravel's Bolero, in which she was not using a baton, and Stravinsky's Le Sacre du Printemps (The Rite of Spring), when she did use a baton.

Finally, Mélisse pointed out that although she will not be conducting the GSO this coming weekend, her concert week will be rescheduled for later this season. She looks forward to

meeting many RMA members in person, as she likes to mingle with the audience after each performance.
