TODAY'S SPEAKER

HOLLISTER STURGES introduced Betsy McCaughey, Ph.D. Dr. McCaughey started off by reading out several statistics showing how the effectivity of medical care in the U.S.A. has improved over the years, such as cancer survivorship and life expectancy. She then gave the credit for these improvements to "medical innovation", new drugs, equipment and modalities of care. Most of her talk was dedicated to describing the current bill in Congress associated with "medicare for all" MFA and how it would hamper medical innovation, minimize further improvements in the health of the nation and force doctors and hospitals to reduce the quality of healthcare. The current bill would outlaw all commercial and private insurance. That would force 156 million people to lose their existing employer insurance and they could only be covered by the federal medical insurance program. Currently, Medicare covers 86 cents on the dollar, with the other 14 cents being picked up by those with private or commercial insurance. Under this current bill, there will be no alternative to charge private insurance, therefore doctors would be losing approximately 30%. Naturally this would force doctors to see more patients per hour and seniors will be severely impacted by these changes if the bill is approved as is.

The "third leg of her stool" was that inadequate infection control in hospitals. Studies have shown that pathogens are everywhere in hospitals and inadequate cleaning routines lead to unnecessary illness "caught" in hospitals. There has been progress, 30 plus states require hospitals to report infection rates. Some government reimbursement programs now tie the level of reimbursement to the hospital's infection control numbers. A lively RMA Q&A followed.
