

TODAY'S SPEAKER

BOB PHILLIPS introduced Les de Villiers who spoke on "Gorillas in our Midst". Tracking the mountain gorillas in the Virunga Mountains of Rwanda was, in his words, "a life changing experience". Mr. de Villiers grew up in South Africa and is a graduate of its Stellenbosch University with a Doctorate in Economic History.

He said gorillas first came to the attention of the modern world in 1845 although ancient texts in 500BC refer to them as "hairy beasts". Despite their menacing size and King Kong appearance, gorillas are gentle creatures. They are family oriented with a male silverback dominating the group.

Experienced native guides took Mr. de Villiers and a small group through an exhausting mountain hike to the gorilla habitat. As they were instructed, everyone took a submissive attitude as the silverback approached within a couple of feet. Closeup photos revealed their majestic appearance.

Mountain gorillas were being slaughtered for bushmeat and only about 800 now survive. Dian Fossey's book and film "Gorillas in the Mist" brought their plight to the attention of the public. The talk was accompanied by excellent photos, videos and graphics.
