TODAY'S SPEAKERS

BOB RIMMER introduced **Peter Bernstein**, Chairman of the Greenwich Board of Education, and **Ralph Mayo**, Interim Superintendent of Greenwich Public Schools, who both addressed *How School is Different in the 21st Century.*

Mr. Bernstein spoke of the complexities in running a school system that has 9,000 students who come from backgrounds that speak 87 languages. To meet a changing world, he stressed, schools must change.

Mr. Mayo, who attended Greenwich schools, told of the strategic planning that weaves academics and personal planning with interpersonal studies.

Mr. Bernstein then introduced the following three school principals.

Marc D'Amico, Glenville School, told of the school's five day approach to learning using a four point system: Problem Solving, Goal Setting, Lesson Sequence and Making Learning Personal. He stressed Glenville's student centered learning environment and its new Design Lab for STEM teaching.

Jill Flood, North Street School, emphasized the school's personalized learning and critical thinking where students set their own goals. New innovative tools are employed such as Vision Boards where students share their goals, flexible seating, a stationary bike to get rid of excess energy, stand up desks and tilt brush animation with 3-D goggles.

Jason Goldstein, Eastern Middle School, spoke of the use of modern personal devices that allow teachers to assess students' responses instantly and remedy problems individually. Students engage in a game called *Kahouti* on their devices that gauge their answers. The teacher can see what is working and what is not working.

Mr. Bernstein wrapped up the presentation with glowing statistics that show the Greenwich School System is No 1 in Connecticut!
