LLI offers persons over the age of 50 courses in a wide range of subjects aimed at promoting self-improvement and engagement with others with similar interests. **RON** provided copies of the spring 2019 LLI catalog.

Volunteering: RICH BISK introduced MICHAEL AMBROSINO, who described volunteer opportunities at Covenant House in Stamford. MICHAEL noted that Covenant House serves approximately 220 meals per day, 365 days per year to people in need. He suggested two ways to volunteer: 1) serving meals or 2) pantry assistance. Meals are prepared by area religious organizations who deliver to the Covenant House and are then served by volunteers. The pantry is essentially a grocery store where vetted clients shop monthly under the guidance of volunteers.

RICH also emphasized the need to report volunteer hours and introduced **GERRY MAYFIELD** as the VOLUNTEERING PEST, who will be a visible goad at meetings urging members to report their volunteer hours. **JERRY SCHWENDEMAN** offered the following limerick in support of **RICH's** efforts:

TODAY'S SPEAKER

Professor Theresa Kelleher Ph.D. discussed the origin and growth of the ancient trade route known as the Silk Road. She explained how, beginning in about 139 BCE, the Silk Road, which was not a single "road", but a network of many paths, evolved to allow trade to begin and flourish among different communities from northern China through the Middle East into Europe. Professor Kelleher noted the great value of the Silk Road was that it fostered the exchange of ideas among different cultures. The flow of commerce led to the intermingling of religions, arts, technology, etc. Interestingly, although many commodities were traded along the "road," it was the special value of silk, especially in the West, that led to the network of trading routes from China to Europe that ultimately led to what was to be called the "Silk Road." Professor Kelleher provided members with an insightful picture into how international trade was conducted for more than a thousand years.
