TODAY'S SPEAKER

After the break, TAD LARRABEE introduced the **speaker, Hugh Price**. Hugh has been **a lawyer for the Black Coalition**, become an editorial writer for the New York Times, a VP for the Rockefeller Foundation, and President and CEO for the National Urban League. He focus of his talk was **his new book "This African American Life; From Valley Forge to Civil Rights"**. He traced his family's history leading to his career. Beginning with slavery, his ancestors fought in the American Civil War, and performed other deeds to obtain and/or purchase their freedom. One of his ancestors worked with Edison to perfect the light bulb. Hugh's own history involved creating the Campaign for African-American Achievement, working with government and civil organizations to combat police racial profiling, and defending affirmative action. He is currently serving on the National Commission on Social, Emotional, and Academic Development.
