SPEAKER PROGRAM

Moderator ARNOLD GORDON welcomed everyone and introduced Bill Diamond, President and CEO of the SETI Institute in Mountain View, CA. Mr. Diamond has over 30 years' experience with various technology companies, from venture-backed start-ups to Fortune 100 multinationals, including CEO positions at several firms. He holds a B.A. in physics from Holy Cross College and a Master's in Business Administration from Georgetown University. The SETI Institute (Search for Extraterrestrial Intelligence) is a nonprofit astrophysics and astrobiology research and education organization focused on the study of life in the Universe, a venture that, as Mr. Diamond states, is on a journey of ultimate discovery. SETI seeks answers to the daunting questions: "Are We Alone? Are we unique? Is (or was) there life elsewhere in the universe?" Mankind has pondered these age-old questions from Galileo to NASA (SETI is a prime contractor); even the Vatican has interest, with its own astronomer. As Mr. Diamond pointed out, it is only now that we have the tools and better understanding of galactic structures to allow serious attempts to provide answers. He provided a sweeping survey of the size and structure of the universe as we know it, with its mind-numbing dimensions and complexity. Our own galaxy, the Milky Way, spans a distance of 100,000 light years (one light year is about 6 trillion miles!) and contains more than 3600 comets and 900,000 asteroids, and billions of stars! The stars we see in the sky are all suns with their own

planets; it is estimated that there are billions of earth-like planets within our galaxy, whose size is somewhere between that of Mars and Neptune. Attempts are still being made to estimate how many technologically capable civilizations might exist in the cosmos through the use of equations developed many years ago by Frank Drake, Carl Sagan and other prominent astronomers and astrophysicists.

There are three ways to search for life: instruments and probes on site, like the Perseverance that recently landed on Mars; remote sensing, such as bio-signatures (presence of life-forming chemicals in the atmosphere, e.g.) detected with telescopes; signals of the type that SETI and its partners are capable of detecting with radio telescopes and other arrays. The equipment used by SETI is capable of scanning the entire Milky Way and beyond. Currently, detection of bio-signatures is limited to distances of about 30 light years (huge in Earth terms – 180 trillion miles – but small in outer space terms). It is important to realize that if a signal were to be detected from some far-off body, given the speed of light, such a signal would have originated hundreds or thousands of years ago! To date, there has been no evidence for convincing signals or other observations for intelligent life beyond earth, notwithstanding stories about UFOs. But the search goes on. The curiosity is an engine for innovation and SETI's work has influenced research in other areas such as climate change and communication/signal processing.

SETI is also involved in an extensive Education and Outreach program with teachers and organizations like the Girl Scouts, where 100,000 girls recently participated in one of their programs. SETI has an artists-in-residence program for works inspired by the science involved; through lectures and debates, it also educates the public on all-things-space.
