TODAY'S SPEAKER

Today's speaker was Mrs. Silvia Reiss a recorder and collector of 17th and 18th century stone walls, with an emphasis on the walls of Connecticut. She is a retired teacher. She told us that after the Revolutionary War, farmers began building walls to mark property boundaries. Engineers built churches, bridges, dams, jails, culverts, and cellar walls. Her focus for today's discussion was on the evolution of free-standing walls in New England. She explained that there are two categories of stone walls. "Dry Walls" that have no mortar between the individual stones and mortared walls or "Wet Walls" made of gneiss, schist and igneous stones and have no limit to how high they can go, although eventually the mortar shrinks and erodes, and ultimately the stones become unaligned. Stone walls are the signature legacy of New England.
