TODAY'S SPEAKER

BOB PHILLIPS introduced Kevin Gutzman, Professor of History at Western Connecticut State University who spoke on the content of his book; *Thomas Jefferson-Revolutionary: A Radical's Struggle to Remake America*. Jefferson, whose design of the University of Virginia established him as one of America's eminent architects, sought to establish states' rights over central government as crucial to a republic. He abolished the feudal land tenure which gave voting rights to only a select few. Prof Gutzman outlined four elements of Jefferson's hope for America.

Federalism: His concept that the Federal Government is a "foreign government" that gives to each state the primacy over a central government. This, in turn, grants ultimate rights to each citizen.

Freedom of Conscience: Colonists viewed Jefferson as a heretic because he felt that true religious freedom could not coexist with the Church of England. Many said, "Hide your bible if Jefferson becomes President".

Colonialism: Initially he thought a biracial society could not exist. He felt all slaves should be returned to Africa but the invention of the cotton gin changed everything. Now slave labor was desperately needed.

Assimilation: At the start of the Revolution there were 2 ½ million colonists and ½ million slaves. Though he was a slave owner he felt a democratic republic could not survive until all inhabitants, including Indians, were assimilated as free citizens.

Education: His view that education is essential to a democracy spurred him to promote secondary education for all citizens. A regional and intermediary education would identify potential leaders.

Professor Gutzman's absorbing presentation consumed the entire hour and left no time for Q&A.
