TODAY'S PROGRAM

Our speaker, Congressman **Jim Himes**, is serving his fourth term in Connecticut's 4th District and is a member of the U.S. House Permanent Committee on Intelligence. He has, accordingly, unique insight on events in the Middle East, particularly ISIS and Iran, and he gave us a comprehensive and highly informative presentation.

He explained that the roots of the difficulties in the Middle East lie in the fact that we try to associate with countries who share our values, but these are not easily identified, and competing groups are not always identified with a country. We should be skeptical in general about claims for our support. He suggested that we adhere to two nonnegotiable priorities: no tolerance of global terrorism, and support of Israel.

He views Iran as a "real" country with a long history of civilization. Regarding our current negotiations, the nuclear "framework" is OK if the issue of verification can be resolved. Lifting of sanctions is very risky.

Mr. Himes was introduced by his father with stories about hazardous early childhood experiences. A number of our members commended him for his lucid presentation.
