TODAY'S SPEAKER: Bob Stone introduced Chief Jim Heavy, Greenwich Chief of Police. Greenwich's 283 miles of road and 18 miles of coastline are well protected by 155 officers (12 of them female) patrolling the area and responding to some 40,000 incident calls a year. (16 civilian operators handle the calls.) Keeping as many officers as possible active is a challenge because it takes time to get new recruits through the police academy and fully up to speed, and at any time close to 50 officers may be eligible for retirement. Getting police cars equipped with online computers has been very helpful. Chief Heavy began his career in Greenwich in 1986, and was appointed to his present office in 2012. He is an Army veteran and has served as military police officer. Like about a third of the police force, he lives in Greenwich.
