TODAY'S SPEAKER

Stuart Gibson is an international museum and cultural policy expert with close ties to the Hermitage, Russia's flagship museum that was founded in 1764 by Catherine the Great and which just celebrated its 250th anniversary. He was Director of UNESCO's Hermitage Museum Development Project for 10 years and is a founding member and currently Secretary of the Hermitage Museum International Advisory Board. With slides, he traced the history of St. Petersburg (the "Venice of the North"), built on swampland in the 18th century, and the structures and holdings of the Hermitage, which consist of over 3 million items, only 6% of which are on museum display at any time. He whetted everyone's appetite for a visit by showing and describing the magnificent structures and artwork, including some of the largest collections of many artists' works (e.g., Matisse, Rembrandt) as well as some of the most valuable pieces of art and sculpture in the world. It was one of the longer and more impressive presentations by RMA speakers,

and could have gone longer; it held everyone's rapt attention. In addition to the 107 men present at the business meeting, there were 24 walk-ins for his talk. Mr. Gibson's excellent talk will soon be available on Vimeo via the RMA website: www.greenwichrma.org.
