TODAY'S SPEAKER: Harvard professor **Laurence Kantor**, formerly Managing Director and Global Head of Research at Barclays. He pointed out that we are into the 8th year of slow recovery from what happened in 2008. We probably have another year or two before a recession starts. Such events as China's bubble bursting, or Britain's exit from the Euro market might be two factors that spark a recession. Markets could lose confidence in the Euro, or in China's ability to keep buying U.S. treasury notes. But he said that the fact the U.S. has an abundance of cheap energy in the ground, that most technical innovation comes from the U.S. and immigrants are hammering at our doors to bring their skills to us, is the good news. The bad news is that we've got to get used to slow growth for the long term.
