COMMITTEE REPORTS:

PROGRAM: GEORGE UBOGY gave us a preview of today's speaker, Sherman Bull, MD, who spoke about his mountain climbing exploits, especially Mt. Everest; see details below. STEPHEN MEYERS announced that next week's speaker will be Denise Savageau, Conservation Director for the Town of Greenwich, who will speak on potential effects of climate change on the Town.

TODAY'S SPEAKER

Dr. Sherman Bull, a retired surgeon from the Greenwich-Stamford area, regaled the audience with his stories of grit and endurance in mountain climbing, a hobby he undertook at age 40, and which took him to the tallest peaks on all 7 continents with successful climbs to the top. With slides illustrating the various places and steps along the way, he described how after 5 attempts over a 9 year period, he was able to climb to the top of Mt. Everest in 2001, becoming the oldest man (64) to date to accomplish that feat. Two other records were achieved on that climbing expedition: his son accompanied him, making them the first father-son pair to reach the top; and that was the expedition during which the first blind man, Erik Weienheimer, made the climb to the top as part of the team. The base camp for the climb is 17,000 feet above sea level with another 12,000 feet to the top (officially 29,028 feet). As a large, atypical geologic structure, Mt. Everest and its surroundings have their own, often unpredictable weather, making for some very challenging and dangerous encounters. Dr. Bull and the entire expedition team were greeted at the White House by President G. W. Bush in recognition of their singular accomplishments.
