Program: BOB PHILLIPS reported that today's speaker will be Mark Nunan, Ph.D., who will speak on the subject: "Fiorello La Guardia: Scourge of the Old Order, Inventor of the New." ARNOLD GORDON said that next week's speaker will be Dana Gunders, Executive Director and founding board member of ReFED, a national nonprofit working to advance solutions to reduce loss and waste throughout our food system. Ms. Gunders is a national expert on food systems and one of the first people to raise the alarm about how much food is wasted across the country and the subsequent impacts on our environment, food security, and the economy. The title of Ms. Gunders' talk is "Rethinking Our Food System: How Wasting Less is Critical to Sustainability." The RMA has invited WasteFree Greenwich (www.wastefreegreenwich.org/), whose mission is to share relevant information & news to build awareness and educate residents toward a waste free community, to attend. They will have an exhibit in the Social Hall.

TODAY'S SPEAKER

BOB PHILLIPS introduced Mark Nunan, Ph.D., a retired international executive and former Senior Vice President at COS, Inc., a private firm which provides business and economic development services to corporations and governments. Dr. Nunan, who recently spoke to the RMA on the life and times of Robert Moses, on this occasion offered a biographical presentation on Fiorello La Guardia's impact as a three-term reform mayor of New York City, describing him as the scourge of the old order and inventor of the new order or new city. In 1933 La Guardia was elected the 99th mayor of NYC, but only the twelfth since the consolidation of Queens, Brooklyn, The Bronx and Staten Island with Manhattan in 1888 to form the city as we know it today.

During his early years, the La Guardia family re-located frequently, because Fiorello's father was a renowned musician, who travelled throughout Europe and, eventually, the United States. At some point Fiorello's father joined the U.S. army and was assigned to Prescott, AZ, where Fiorello, an avid reader, learned of the corrupt Tammany Hall, and the Democrat Party control of NYC. At another time, while on assignment in New Orleans, Fiorello's father was poisoned by the toxic ingredients in the food served to service men. Though his father survived, Fiorello developed a hatred for the profiteers, who profited from allowing the toxic content of the food. As a young adult, Fiorello, who was multi-lingual, took a position with the State Department in Croatia, where he learned that many Croatians seeking admission to the United States were being turned away, because they failed medical testing at Ellis Island. He also learned that the Cunard Steamship Line was making significant profits from transporting ill Croatians to and from the United States. He argued that medical testing be done on emigrants prior to their leaving their homeland to avoid having to pay Cunard for return trips. His proposal was accepted and implemented throughout Europe.

Because he observed so much corruption in so many places and organizations, Fiorello resolved to become a "Ghetto Lawyer" and defend the powerless. In today's terms, he would be called a strong progressive. He ran for Congress in 1914, but lost; however, he defeated the same opponent in 1916. He voted to enter WW1, resigned from Congress, joined the army and was sent to Italy, where he played a major role in the success of Italy's aircraft industry (he was a licensed pilot) and spoke frequently in support of the war effort.

Upon his return to the U.S. Fiorello was elected President of NYC's Board of Aldermen, where he set about rooting-out corruption. Sixty-seven Aldermen were jailed during his first year. He was re-elected to Congress as a Socialist in 1924, but soon joined the Republican party. He was elected NYC mayor in 1933 running on a fusion ticket supported by a coalition of regular Republicans, a minority of reform-minded Democrats, Socialists, a large proportion of middle-class Jews, and the great majority of Italians. The Italians had been loyal to Tammany; their switch proved decisive.

As mayor, during the Great Depression and World War II, La Guardia unified the city's transit system; expanded construction of public housing, playgrounds, parks, and airports; reorganized the NYC Police Department; and implemented FDR's federal New Deal programs within the city. He pursued a long series of political reforms curbing the power of the powerful Tammany Hall political machine and re-establishing merit-based employment and promotion within city administration.
