#### **TODAY'S SPEAKER**

HORST TEBBE introduced his son Nelson, a professor of Constitutional Law at Cornell University Law School. Prof. Tebbe used the recent case of the War Memorial in Bladensburg, Maryland shaped like a large Latin cross which sits on public land as an example of a type of first amendment cases that come before the courts. The Supreme Court ruled, that in this case, it was permissible. He also cited the case of a monument to Robert E Lee in Charlottesville, VA as a secular similar case.

He presented eight strategies used by lawyers to justify, or not, the use of religious symbols by state actors. Pointing out the strengths and weaknesses of each of these strategies in the two cases cite.
