TV SERIES REVIEW

We were treated to a review of the Amazon Prime Series *The Restaurant* by **HOLLISTER STURGES.** Similar to a modern-day *Downton Abbey* with Swedish and English subtitles, it takes place in Stockholm just after World War II ends and goes into the early '70s. A family story, spanning two generations, with well-defined characters, romance, love, greed, intrigue and betrayal, and ambition.

The superb photography of 20th century Stockholm is combined with lots of plots and subplots, impossible love affairs, star-crossed lovers, bitter family rivalry, child custody disputes, class struggle, marital problems, even petty spats in the kitchen. Not to be overlooked are contemporary issues and conflicts that include immigration, child custody challenges, labor disputes, gay rights, old age, and illness. TODAY'S SPEAKER

HOLLISTER STURGES introduced Today's Speaker, Dr. Robert Gallucci. Robert Gallucci is an American diplomat and Distinguished Professor in the Practice of Diplomacy at Georgetown University. He has held teaching posts at Swarthmore College, Johns Hopkins University and Georgetown University. He received fellowships from Harvard University and the Brookings Institution, among others. The discussion today focused on "Major U.S. Foreign Policy Challenges." The discussion was skillfully facilitated by HOLLISTER using an interview format. Professor Gallucci provided comments on a wide range of foreign policy topics including current Biden administration foreign policy aspirations, challenges posed by China, Russia, and Afghanistan, as well as the political climate in America and its impact on foreign policy.

In general, Robert Gallucci expressed his relief to see Joe Biden elected as President of the United States. He knew Biden as a Senator and as Chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and he feels Biden is steeped in the tradition of American foreign policy. President Trump was innocent in a lot of the assumptions that people make about the foundations of American foreign policy such as the importance of alliances and our standing as a voice of reason or a moral authority in the international scene. He gives President Biden high marks in terms of his declaratory policies for issues that affect the American people at home and how they will affect our foreign policy.

HOLLISTER introduced one topic that was very timely for today's presentation, the U.S. withdrawal from Afghanistan.

Question: Regarding our withdrawal from Afghanistan, was it the right policy or flawed execution?

Professor Gallucci: America has been in Afghanistan since 2001, and actually before that in a covert manner. Getting out of Afghanistan was not a sudden decision, we have been attempting to get out for ten years and there was great enthusiasm for that decision. The Taliban really came back to Afghanistan before the US left. That was because there were limits to American training and cultural change that can be imposed on a country. We have

seen a growth in American objectives, considering that our original mission was to get Osama Bin Ladin. However, many things have happened since 2001 and our objectives have been modified over the years. It is not in America's interest to stay there, and while we can leave some troops behind, as we have done in Europe, Korea, and Japan, we attempted to make a transition to utilize Afghani military to maintain order. The recent catastrophic imagery will hurt us, what is going to happen to those left on the ground is a major question. Laying all this history at Biden's feet is unfair, however what has just happened, and the terrible images created, are his responsibility. This was poor execution to say the least. However, fundamentally, the basic issue of withdrawal is the right decision. We would only continue to remain in Afghanistan if the US leadership and its people are willing to expend our blood and treasure to preserve a way of life that cannot be preserved without our continued presence.

Professor Gallucci responded an array of foreign policy topics, providing insightful and informative opinions. The discussion was followed by questions and answers from the inperson audience as well as the zoom audience.
