JOHN De CSEPEL introduced HOLLISTER STURGES who started the event with a brief description of the life of painter George C. Bingham starting his career as a cabinet maker and developed into an eventually wonderful painter of the frontier, viewed on the Missouri River from 1834 to 1850. His paintings of boatmen on the River ranging from "Fur Trader" to "The Wood Boat" showed clear perspective of working figures on the River before the steamboats.
