TODAY'S PROGRAM: Dr. Jack Hughes gave a thorough overview of the history of the Affordable Care Act (aka Obamacare), beginning with the startling statistics of our being 30th out of 34 advanced-economy nations in infant mortality and 22nd (male) and 25th(female) in life expectancy, despite the fact that we spend vastly more money on health care than these other nations. He called it the paradox of Excess and Deprivation. Before Obamacare, fully 15% of our citizens had no health insurance, a figure that is now down to 11% and maybe less. One reason it is still so high: almost half of those who might be covered don't even know about the ACA. The administration has done a terrible marketing job. It wasn't helped, however, by the attempts to sabotage the ACA, including quite frightening ads intended to dissuade young people from signing up. John Roberts' deciding vote last June may have saved the ACA for now, but the results of the next presidential election might permit another opportunity to dismantle it. Stay tuned!
