### **TODAY'S SPEAKER**

Mark Albertson, an adjunct history professor at Norwalk Community College, was introduced by **STEVE BOIES**. Mark traced the life of Joseph Stalin (born loseb Besarionis dze Jughashvili), 1878-1953. He was a Georgian revolutionary and Soviet politician who led the Soviet Union from the mid–1920s until 1953. He was General Secretary of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union from 1922 (taking over from Lenin, who had suffered several strokes) until 1952 and was then Premier (1941–1953). A communist ideologically committed to the Leninist interpretation of Marxism, Stalin formalized these ideas as Marxism–Leninism; his own policies are known as Stalinism but were administered as a de facto dictator. His father was a drunken cobbler who

beat the young Stalin frequently, which surely influenced his later brutal behavior towards his "enemies." Although his mother sent him to a seminary, he was only interested in revolutionary literature, left before graduation, and did not have any contact with his mother for 40 years. In his youth, he served 6 prison terms (Siberia gulag) for various crimes (robbery, etc.). Stalin joined with Lenin as head of the Bolshevik faction of the Russian Social Democratic Party determined to bring down the proletariats who used serfs to work the land and factories as indentured servants. After the Russian Revolution in 1917, banks, other financial institutions and large companies were nationalized. Although Stalin is regarded more of a state capitalist than a communist, his name is synonymous with totalitarianism. Although he was responsible for millions of deaths of his own people due to his brutal machinations throughout his leadership, he was responsible for the massive industrialization of the Soviet Union between 1927 and 1949, which was a major factor in their victory over the Nazis in WWII and for making the USSR the second strongest, atomic bomb holding world power. When he died in March 1953, Nikita Khrushchev became Premier.
