Human Interest: JIM FISHBEIN entertained us with a planetary quiz, replete with excellent photographs.


Speakers: **BOB MEANY** previewed Dr. Curtis Martin, who will speak to us today on "American Whaling in the Age of Sail". There will be no speaker next week on account of the picnic. **GEORGE UBOGY** previewed the September 22 speaker, Stuart Malina, who is a candidate for the conductor of the Greenwich Symphony Orchestra.

TODAY'S SPEAKER

BOB MEANY introduced Dr. Curtis Martin, who retired from Merrimack College in 2012. Dr. Martin is a graduate of Harvard and obtained his Doctorate from Tufts. He speaks to us on the topic "American Whaling in the Age of Sail", one of his post-retirement scholarly pursuits.

The whaling "industry" in America dates back to Colonial times and extended into the post World War I period of the early '20s. The heyday was in the mid 19th century, when it was the fifth most important industry and the third most important in New England. Whale oil was the central "product", and it was of international importance both for lighting and lubrication. Baleen, obtained from the mouths of non-toothed whales, was an important if secondary by-product--used where we might now use plastics or spring steel--e.g. womens corsets, umbrellas and canes. A momentous change for the industry was the construction of sailing ships that were able to not only capture and kill but also "process" the animal byproducts while still at sea. Even though there were refining plants on shore, the whale blubber was rendered, boiled into oil and stored in barrels aboard ships. At its peak, the industry employed 70,000 people. Many of the important whaling centers were along the New England Coast. (New Bedford was prominent, but Hartford may have been the fourth largest.)

Dr. Martin provided and illustrated the details of life aboard a whaling ship--the actual harpooning and killing of the whales, the on-board butchering and rendering of the blubber and other by products. He provided a thorough picture of the sailor's life, living quarters, diet and hazardous duty. Voyages in the late 19th Century could last up to five years. After the Civil War, whaling declined--mainly on account of the discovery of petroleum. The California Gold Rush also led to a decline in available crew members, who often abandoned their ships in California ports in search of easier fortune.
