Book Review: ED MILLER offered a review of the book, *The Rise and Fall of Bin Laden*, by Peter Bergen. In light of all that is going on in the world today, **ED** suggests that, if you have an interest in how a rich Saudi man became the number one most hated person in the world, this well documented book will help you understand why and how Bin Laden became a jihadist with a hatred for Russia and America, and how he survived for so long before he was eventually found and killed in Pakistan.

TODAY'S SPEAKER

Using an unusual RMA guest speaker format, **GEORGE UBOGY** interviewed Maestro Stuart Malina, a long-time music director and conductor, in what was a very informative and entertaining hour. Maestro Malina is currently Music Director for the Harrisburg, PA, Symphony Orchestra. He gave members an insight into how he migrated from being a math major at Harvard to being the music director and conductor for Broadway shows and symphony orchestras in several major U.S. cities. He noted that he is the son of music loving parents, and that growing up he was surrounded by music. He became aware of his musical talent when he began learning the piano at a very early age, and discovered he had a great gift for sight reading

Early on Maestro Malina began music teaching and directed many junior high school and high school productions. With a Harvard music degree in-hand he sought directing and conducting positions in New York, but such positions were few and far between. Through a friend he secured an invitation to apply for the Charleston, SC, symphony orchestra, as Assistant Director. Initially rejected for the position, he was recalled and ultimately became director and spent about 15 years in that position. During that period, he also won a Tony for orchestrating the works of Billy Joel in collaboration with choreographer Twyla Tharp. He has done some musical compositions, but he does not think of himself as a writer. When asked what is important in program development, Maestro Malina offered several suggestions including: challenge the orchestra; balance style (e.g., baroque / modern); market the program; include a familiar or loved piece; watch the bottom line. When asked what to look for in a concert, he suggested a good program will affect the listener emotionally, will communicate well with the audience, and will evince good chemistry between conductor and orchestra.

When asked the difference between conductor and director, Maestro Malina said the conductor conducts. The director chooses the program and, frequently, the players, markets the program, obtains funding, etc. He noted that his current employer, the Harrisburg Symphony, and the Greenwich Symphony are both Per Service symphonies, i.e., members are paid per rehearsal/performance, as opposed to being salaried. Maestro Milano concluded the program by offering a "one-minute" course on how to be a conductor, and with a snappy piano rendition of Gershwin's "I Got Rhythm."
