TODAY'S SPEAKER

Wes Hayes, Executive Director of the Merritt Parkway Conservancy (www.merrittparkway.org). He started his scholarly presentation with a detailed history of the Merritt Parkway.

In the early 1920s, the Boston Post Road was essentially southern Connecticut's main traffic trunk. But, by the 1930s, it had become "visually polluted". Helen Binney Kitchel, who decried billboards, and Congressman Schuyler Merritt were two of the prime movers in the initiation of a project to construct a parkway that might extend into

Connecticut from the previously constructed Bronx River Parkway. The essential idea was that the new parkway should blend into the existing countryside. A continuous median divide and the planting of native vegetation would be supplemented by 69 different ornamental bridge designs, and there would be no stop lights. The bulk of the construction was completed over 6 years. The land-scaping involved heavy civic engagement. Mr. Hayes provided detailed information on the designs of the various bridges, including their unique sculptures and bas-reliefs.

In 1938, the Parkway was designed for 45 miles per hour traffic. In 2003, the Parkway saw 57, 000 vehicles per day and 85 per cent of them were traveling at 73 miles per hour. The Parkway is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. A Period of Renewal was initiated in the 90's. Recent attention has been focused on aesthetic and effective guard rails, 8- foot breakdown lanes and upgrading of the service areas. The issue of reinstitution of tolls in Connecticut poses a threat to the Parkway's architectural integrity and is currently being hotly debated.
