NEXT WEEK'S SPEAKER

PETER BERG previewed Christopher Bruhl, the President and CEO of the Business Council of Fairfield County. Mr. Bruhl will be speaking about Connecticut and Fairfield County business trends in light of projected population decrease and increasing vehicular traffic.

TODAY'S SPEAKER

Thomas J. McGlynn, Jr. was introduced by JOHN CARON. The topic was "A Greenwich Resident's Perspective on Living and Working in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia." Mr. McGlynn was Tax Director for Price-Waterhouse Coopers for 25 years. He spent six years in Saudi Arabia, where he was responsible for tax advice to 1800 Americans working at Saudi Oil and their 25 most senior Saudi executives. He pointed out that Riyadh is very "metropolitan" but that the Saudis are very outwardly religious and 100 per cent Muslim. The Call to Prayer is widely observed, and the Prayer times are published daily in the newspapers. The dress code is taken seriously, especially for women. Only recently have women been allowed to drive automobiles. King Abdullah founded a thriving co-ed engineering and technical university. Saudi Arabia is essentially "land-locked", surrounded by friendly countries. Neighboring Bahrain, which is connected to Saudi Arabia by a twenty-mile causeway, is an "almost free country" by comparison. The country is quite arid, and there is very little greenery to be seen.
