SPEAKER

JOHN DeCSEPEL introduced Professor **Philip McKnight**, a leading authority on environmental law and history, with a long and distinguished law career. The U.S. has traditionally shied away from involvement in foreign affairs. As a result, treaties relating to environmental protection, dating back to the 1970s, have often failed to win congressional approval. These treaties generally called for the developed nations – and particularly the U.S - to provide the funding while developing nations were exempt. In 1987 the Montreal Protocol for protection of the ozone layer gained acceptance but the subsequent Kyoto Protocol to halt emission of greenhouse gases and mitigate global heating did not. Professor McKnight emphasized the importance of addressing these environmental issues more actively, and the need for the U.S. to take a stronger leadership role, without which there will be little progress.
