TODAY'S SPEAKER

Today's speaker was **Deirdre McDonald**. She was introduced by her father. Her subject was "Lobbying in Today's Washington: Navigating the Shifting Sands". She works in Washington as a lobbyist on behalf of Sony Music, owner of Columbia

Records, RCA Victor, and EMI records, among others. Her challenging task for Sony Music is to protect the royalties of the original creators of the music on Sony's records, in the face of threats from many sides. Examples of the erosion of this protection abound: pirating by unscrupulous hackers, especially in China and other Asian countries, of the intellectual property of the creators; the evolution of music sources away from records to the internet, like Napster, Google, Amazon, Spotify, Apple etc. Payments to the creators have become increasingly small as the years go by. They are now infinitesimal. Deidre has a job not unlike that of the Greek god Sisyphus who constantly worked at pushing a huge rock up a mountain, only to have it roll back, and he would push it up again, as time went by, into infinity. Her talk was very well illustrated with slides, and she answered many questions from an audience of members and many men and women from the community.
