COMMITTEE REPORTS

TODAY'S SPEAKER

Dr. Joel Blatt, Professor of European History at UConn, gave us a very interesting lecture dealing with the question of whether, or to what degree, the financial penalties imposed on Germany by the Versailles peace treaty at the end of World War I were too severe, and became a primary motivating factor for Germany to precipitate World War II.

The treaty called for Germany to pay reparations on the order of \$20 billion (in 1921 dollars) over a period of time, but only about \$3 billion were actually paid up to the time of the depression, after which time further payments were suspended. Thus the amount actually paid did not have sufficient impact to explain Germany's motivations. However, the hardships originally imposed – whether actually realized or not -- greatly hurt Germany's pride. Hitler was able later to capitalize on the German people's persistent resentment of the treaty.
