ED MILLER is a native of Rochester, New York. He received his A.B. from Ohio Wesleyan University and his M.D. from the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry.

He is a history buff, who enjoys reading, walking and golf. ED was welcomed into the RMA by acclaim.

HUMAN INTEREST SERIES: CHET RISIO introduced SAL DeANGELO, who honored us with an abbreviated story of his WWII experience. The son of Italian immigrants, SAL was drafted into the U.S. Army at age 18 in 1943. He served in the 96th Signal Corps Battalion destined for Calcutta. Serving under General Joseph Stilwell, SAL's group supplied communications for the assault on the Japanese, working closely with Merril's Marauders and an Indian Gurkha division. During this time, SAL met Colonel Gordon Seagraves, renowned missionary and "Burma Surgeon". In Burma, SAL was briefly hospitalized with malaria. While in the hospital, he had a chance meeting with a military doctor, Colonel Craighill, who happened to be a Greenwich native and the wife of SAL's home-town doctor. At the war's end, SAL was fortunate to get back home on Christmas Day of 1945. He subsequently enjoyed life in Greenwich as an automobile salesman with his wife, Anne. They have three children and three grandchildren, all graduates of either Bucknell or Harvard.

TODAY'S

SPEAKER

Connecticut Attorney General William Tong gave a two-part presentation on "Enforcement Actions Against Generic Drug Manufacturers and the Opioid Crisis." With the "Big Tobacco" case as a template, these actions have required a multi-state effort.

Approximately 90% of all prescriptions filled in the U.S. are generics. Paradoxically, prices have risen over the past decade by up to 1000%. Attorney General Tong (who appeared on "60 Minutes on 5/12/19) pointed out the pervasive price-fixing (which is almost always illegal) in this industry. Fortunately, subpoenas have disclosed extensive documentation of what is "the largest cartel in history". AG Tong provided examples of what he describes as "brazen price-fixing and market allocation" and an "endemic breaking of the law".

The annual opioid-related death rate in Connecticut alone is greater than 1000. It is no cliché to describe this problem as ubiquitous. Mr. Tong pointed out that, although the opioid manufacturers bear a great burden of responsibility, the "biggest fish" are the distributors, such as McKesson and Cardinal. Some "bad apples" in the medical profession have contributed to this problem as well.

The various States Attorneys General are striving to protect their citizens from further unfair and deceptive practices.
