TODAY'S SPEAKER

Amy Fleishman, Alex Earles and Marilee Johns wove together the interaction of Greenwich Reading Together and the International Rescue Committee (IRC) to meet the needs of the expanding refugee crisis. Amy spoke to us about Ameracanah, the story about a Nigerian girl and her experience in immigrating to the U.S. and the book chosen for our Reading Together Book of the Year. Alex Earles then spoke about the birth of IRC in the 1930s while also giving us the historical background of immigration since WW II and beyond. Marilee then followed Alex with a review of the present refugee and asylum seekers' conditions with the four functional areas where IAC assists those who qualify in the U.S. Their presentation was eye opening on how the U.S. is assisting those in flight.
