TODAY'S PROGRAM: JOHN CARON introduced Chris Winters, the Head Master of Greenwich High School, who gave us an excellent review of the operation of the Greenwich school system. The basic objective is to prepare students to meet the needs of the 21st century economy. Mr. Winters focused on three areas: 1. What do students need to know -- what knowledge and skills will they need. 2. What should be their attitudinal beliefs, their understanding that, whatever may be their limitations, they can improve through study. And 3. The need to avoid distractions that detract from the educational process. Giving each high school student his or her own Chrome Book computer greatly facilitates communication between teachers and students, and access to information. Eighty percent of Greenwich students go on to college. He also touched on the importance of pre-school programs. The schools provide a wide variety of courses and activities for all levels of academic achievement. (Program attendance was 120.)
