

# **TODAY'S SPEAKERS**

**ARNOLD GORDON** explained that we are trying a new format. Each of three RMA members would talk about a significant event in his life, followed by a question and answer session.

**TAD LARRABEE** was living in Baltimore in 1968, at the time of racial unrest following the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King. A curfew was imposed and the police proceeded with mass arrests of blacks. TAD, together with another young lawyer, responded to radio requests for volunteers with a legal background to assist. They went to the central police station to do what they could. The place was so disorganized that nothing useful could be done. They were then volunteered to the central court building, but the situation there was equally dismal. Judges pronounced arbitrary sentences with no regard for proper procedure, and without regard to the hardship these imposed. The press was not in evidence. There was a total breakdown of the legal process.

**BOB ROBINS** joined the CIA in 1963 after receiving his doctorate in political science. It was the time of the Vietnam war and conflict with the Soviet Union. He was assigned to the Office of Current Intelligence and Analysis, which is responsible for preparing the President's Daily Brief. BOB shared the South Asia Unit with four other analysts. Much of the information was distilled from national newspapers with foreign correspondents and radio but also from highly classified sources. It was not always clear that the Daily Brief reached the President, or that he read it. Rather he generally relied on staff members to pass the information on to him. BOB left the CIA in 1965, preferring an academic life, though he continued to consult with the Agency.

CHET RISIO's story is about building his own house. He was born in Port Chester, and still lives there. He and his family started out in difficult circumstances. All along he nurtured the dream that he and his family would own and live in their own house. He won a scholarship to the School of Design in Manhattan which he attended for three years. During the Korean war he was drafted into military service. Later he worked as a magazine illustrator. To get started on his house he found a 50 by 100 foot lot. Over a number of years the family accumulated the funds to have an architect design the house, hire an excavator, and put down the foundation. He got help from friends of his father who worked in the building trades. Brick by brick and board by board the house took shape. Much of it involved hard manual labor. The house was later expanded to accommodate CHET's parents and his wife and child. They sold the house in 1967, after living in it for 16 years.
