- PETER then noted there was one returnee this week, STEVE BOIES from Salzburg, Austria.

PETER BERG then came to the podium to preview today' speaker, First Selectman of Greenwich Fred Camillo, who will discuss the multiple challenges facing the Town of Greenwich and the progress his administration has made in addressing them. Fred was elected first selectman in 2019. He previously served in the Connecticut House of Representatives for the 151st district from 2009 to 2019. He is a lifelong resident who graduated from Greenwich High School and was a summa cum laude graduate of Manhattanville College. As an experienced businessman, he was a founding member and former director of Greenwich Recycling. His community service incudes being a member of the Representative Town Meeting and serving on many local Greenwich boards.

Next up to the podium was **HORST TEBBE**, who introduced next week's speaker, his son, Nelson Tebbe, whose presentation is entitled "Originalism on the Supreme Court." Originalism is now the favored mode of constitutional interpretation on the Roberts Court. But what is originalism exactly? What are the main arguments for and against the method? What is the competing approach, sometimes called living constitutionalism, and how often is it used in practice, and by whom? Nelson Tebbe, Professor of Law at Cornell Law School, will examine these questions using examples from the Supreme Court including recent decisions on gun rights, reproductive freedom, and the free exercise of religion.

Professor Tebbe teaches courses on constitutional law at Cornell Law School. He works on freedom of speech, freedom of religion, and general constitutional law. He is the author of *Religious Freedom in an Egalitarian Age* (Harvard University Press, 2017). Tebbe holds a B.A. degree from Brown University, a J.D. from Yale Law School and a Ph.D. with distinction from the University of Chicago Divinity School. Before teaching, he clerked for Hon. John M. Walker of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit, worked for the American Civil Liberties Union, and was an associate at Davis, Polk and Wardwell. He was a Fulbright Scholar at the University of Cape Town in South Africa. His most recent articles have appeared in the *Harvard Law Review*, the *Columbia Law Review*, the *Michigan Law*

Review, and he has published in popular outlets including *The New York Times, The Washington Post*, and *The Atlantic*.

HUMAN INTEREST STORY

JOE MANCINELLI then returned to the podium and introduced PETER UHRY who shared with the membership his review of a book, *The Life and Times of Horatio Hornblower*, *A Biography of C.S. Forester's Famous Naval Hero* by C. Northcote Parkinson, published in 1970. He started his review by showing a film clip that PETER said "...says it all... adventure, romance, sailing ships doing battle in the Napoleonic Wars....all brought to life in this classic 1951 movie." But wait......PETER then said that movie was based on a series of books written by C.S. Forester in the 1930s, while the book he was reviewing was written in 1970, demonstrating the continuing interest in this character.

In the early 1800s, much of Europe was mired in the Napoleonic Wars. England, France, Spain and the Turks were duking it out on land and sea. Navies were especially important to the war, with heavy wooden ships, some armed with up to 70-90 guns and manned by 500 men, engaged in frequent sea battles. Many of these events are documented in paintings and later in both fiction and non-fiction books. Books proved a great way to memorialize these times in Europe. For example, the army exploits of Sir Arthur Wellesley, 1st duke of Wellington, in the Peninsula Wars, were described in over a dozen fictional books featuring Lt. Richard Sharpe, written by English author Bernard Cornwell.

Perhaps some members have read naval stories from this period. Patrick O'Brian's naval stories set in about 1810, featuring Captain Jack Aubrey and his trusted companion, Stephen Maturin, make for engrossing reading. The film *Master and Commander*, starring Russell Crowe, was based on the first book in the Jack Aubrey series. If you haven't yet done so, see this film as it is an engaging adventure story and marvelously filmed. Better yet, get hooked on the book series.

Perhaps more famous than the O'Brian series was the Horatio Hornblower book series. C.S. Forester allowed us to experience the life and times of an English naval officer who rose through the ranks. Hornblower is rather like the well-known Lord Nelson in that he became famous for his daring and intelligence while at sea. Interestingly, Forester, in his 12 novels about Hornblower, never puts his character in a battle where Nelson was also present. The 12 Hornblower books let readers experience this period of history and (from

an armchair at home) live the life of the seaman and officers on numerous English warships in the early 1800s.

Several months ago, **PETER** was scouring the shelves at the Recycling Center's Book Swap (Greenwich's best free library) when he stumbled across Mr. Parkinson's book on Hornblower. What a great read. Parkinson filled in so many details about Hornblower, his rise through the ranks, his marriages and his special naval exploits. The author really enriched the reader's understanding of this wonderful character in Forester's books. Among other things **PETER** learned was that Hornblower was a man of action on the deck of a ship but a less extraordinary person on land. Details of his exploits serving the English Navy are clearly presented and readers learn of his two marriages and his subsequent ties to the duke of Wellington. **PETER** finished the Parkinson book, gave it to his wife, who also enjoyed it, and they both told interested people that this biography really helped clear up so many loose ends about Hornblower and enriched their understanding of the times. They said he was a real person, and the book proved it.

Now for **PETER's** confession. He said he was wrong. C.S. Forester's character, Horatio Hornblower was *not* a real person. Forester made up Hornblower, borrowing stories from various historically accurate English naval exploits. He particularly likened his character to a noted Scottish Admiral, Andrew Gordon. **PETER** was crest fallen, embarrassed and had been totally duped. **PETER** stated his wife stopped talking to him for a full day. Okay....so now what? Well, the fact that Parkinson's fictional biography did such a good job of fooling **PETER's** wife and himself, and yet communicated so many factual insights into the "life and times" of this period of English history, convinced him to tell you all about it. A novel it is. Hornblower never existed. **PETER** then stated he must live with it.

PETER went on to state that Forester was also a prolific author of many non-fiction works, other novels and two plays. He penned *The African Queen* in 1935 and *The Good Shepherd* in 1955, the latter recently made into a movie entitled *Greyhound*. It describes the harrowing experiences of convoys in the North Atlantic during WWII. *Greyhound* was released in 2020 and starred Tom Hanks. **PETER** stated in his opinion the movie is well worth seeing and available on your computer.

JOE then returned to the podium and adjourned the meeting for the coffee break, while asking that if any other members have a human interest story they believe would be of interest to the membership to let him know.

TODAY'S SPEAKER



After the coffee break, **PETER BERG** came to the front of the room and introduced Fred Camillo, the First Selectman of Greenwich, to whom he had previously sent a list of 20 questions suggested by the membership. He said he planned to ask Fred, time permitting, to respond regarding the following topics: Traffic & Parking, Parks & Recreation, Housing, The Capital Plan, The Environment, Partisan Politics and Nathaniel Witherell.

Following are brief summaries of some of Fred's responses (recounting his detailed responses to all the questions asked would take many pages, but they can be viewed on the video of the talk on the RMA website).

- TRAFFIC & PARKING ISSUES: A problem. Back in 1969, there were about 14,000 cars registered in Greenwich. Today, about 50 years later, with roughly the same population, there are about 70,000 cars in town plus many cars registered out of state. We are working on many safety-related initiatives, including sidewalks, crosswalks, bump-outs, smart traffic lights, and bike paths and bike sharing.
- PARKS & RECREATION: Regarding the question of adding more dog parks for Greenwich residents to use, we are currently working with the City of Stamford's mayor to add a dog park to its Rosa Hartman Park, which is located on our border with Stamford, to also be open to our residents. Additionally, we are looking at a few locations in Western Greenwich to add a dog park in that area. Regarding the question about adding more pickleball courts, we are currently considering creating more pickleball courts by providing portable nets that can be used by pickleball players at our current tennis court locations.

HOUSING: Regarding adding more affordable housing in Greenwich, it's hard to do.
We are looking to do so by having Greenwich Communities (the former Greenwich
Housing Authority) finance "scattered sites," affordable housing integrated into the
community rather than concentrated in large multi-unit structures. Additionally, we
are looking to enhance our currently Town-owned housing by upgrading their
amenities and landscaping.

- CAPITAL PLAN: Regarding the questions about the Town's long-range plans, we currently have a "vision" in place that looks out 15 years. We have discovered that when we try to plan expenditures for 15 years too much changes, and that is now leading us to concentrate more on a five-year capital plan.
- ENVIRONMENT: Regarding the use of leaf-blowers, we are looking for some compromising on the part of those who want to be able to use them, those who complain about the noise they make, and those who want to ban them altogether. The RTM I am told will be addressing this topic and is considering allowing them for small-size properties during the spring and the fall, but not during the summer.
- PARTISAN POLITICS: "It's gotten toxic" and social media in my opinion is adding to the challenge.

Numerous other questions were addressed.
