

MEMBERSHIP REPORT

PETER STERN began his membership report with the induction of **ENRICO VISELLI**. He called **ENRICO**, and his sponsors, **SAM MARRASSO** and **AK KASSABIAN** to the podium.

SAM MARRASSO provided some nominating remarks: "I met **ENRICO** just within the last year and found him to be congenial and very active in the community. He was born in New York and earned an accounting degree at Pace University. Early on he worked in the computer field and became a database manager. He continued his education at Pacific College in NYC earning a master's degree in acupuncture, being licensed in NY and CT. He taught acupuncture and was a clinic supervisor at the Swedish Institute - Pacific College."

"ENRICO moved to Greenwich in 2015. He is interested in artistic endeavors, displaying his work in the Greenwich area. In fact, he won first prize at the exhibition sponsored by 'The Art Society of Old Greenwich'. In 2019, he also won first prize at the summer exposition of the Greenwich Art Society's held in the Bendheim Gallery. I found his work to be quite interesting, as he enjoys creating subjects involving geometric abstraction, using bright colors and movement."

"In this short period of time, I have found **ENRICO** to be both artistic and technical, two broad aspects of life that we find relevant and valuable."

Then **AK KASSABIAN** gave some seconding comments: "**ENRICO** and I have met (at the YMCA) through a mutual friend over this past year in various exercise and discussion programs and I've found him to be a congenial and a thoughtful person. He is attentive to

the needs of the community and enjoys volunteering. I heartily support his candidacy. Thank you."

PETER then asked for the assembled members to approve **ENRICO**'s acceptance into the RMA by a show of hands. The count being unanimous, he was officially accepted into membership.

PETER continued his report by indicating that, per **CARL WHITE**, there were seventy-five people in attendance at the First Presbyterian Church and nine people watching the meeting on Zoom for a total of eighty-four attendees.

Immediately following the announcement of birthdays, **JIM SANTORA** played the Happy Birthday song on the piano while the members sang their birthday wishes to their fellows.

SPEAKERS PROGRAM

HOLLISTER STURGES introduced next week's speaker Andrew Woelflein, who will present a talk called "The World II Art and Letters of John Cullen Murphy, an American Soldier-Artist in the Pacific Theatre". John Cullen Murphy entered the US Army as a private before the Americans entered WWII; he ended the war as a major serving as a General's Aide de Camp. Trained as an Anti-Aircraft (AA) specialist, his artistic talent was recognized by many including Douglas MacArthur who made him the effective headquarters staff artist in the Pacific. Mentored by Norman Rockwell before the war, Murphy went on to illustrate the nationally syndicated Prince Valiant comic strip for more than 30 years after the war from his home studio in Cos Cob, CT. Over the five years from 1941 to 1945, Murphy wrote approximately 1,000 letters home to his mother on his

wartime experience in both the US and the Pacific, including Australia, New Guinea, the Philippines, and Japan. The Murphy family generously donated his wartime art to the Anne S.K. Brown Military Collection at Brown University in 1995 to mark the 50th anniversary of the end of WWII and donated the letters in 2013.

Andrew Woelflein will discuss this unique primary-source collection and its wartime perspective. Mr. Woelflein has been a Trustee of Anne S.K. Brown Military Collection at Brown University since 1996 and served as the Presiding Trustee from 2013 to 2022. One of the world's foremost collections of military iconography, it uses its vast material of over 28,000 military art images to promote knowledge of military history through lectures, museum exhibitions, supporting research, and publications. Mr. Woelflein has lectured widely on the collection and is the author of Herbert Knotel's German Armies in Color (2007), featuring depictions of German army units from the 17th to 20th century.

He is a financial services executive, serving as the Chief Strategy Officer of Monex, a global FinTech provider of corporate foreign exchange and international payment services. He holds a BA from Brown University in European History and an MBA from the Harvard Business School.

RESTAURANT REVIEW

MICHAEL AMBROSINO provided the group with a restaurant review of Myrna's Restaurant at 148 Mason Street, Greenwich CT. Phone Number, (203) 869-1500. He highlighted the following points:

- Located In the middle of downtown Greenwich
- · Serving breakfast, lunch and dinner
- Closed on Sundays
- Plenty of parking, adjacent to a municipal parking lot free after 5:00.
- Dress code is jeans, sneakers and shirt, family oriented
- Restaurant is small, seats only 20 guests
- The owners, Pierre and Myrna Lahound are gracious proactive hosts, who will ensure your visit is enjoyable. Do not hesitate to ask them any questions you may have.
 - Tables are rather close, noise can be rather loud
- Cost: Appetizers range from \$14 to \$20; Entrees between \$25 to \$34; Desserts \$8 and Wine \$14 by the glass and approximately \$55 by the bottle. Kids menu is \$15
- Food: The food offering is fresh authentic Mediterranean food in a quaint environment. First and foremost, all food is prepared homemade on the premises with the exception of the bread. Although the menus offers pasta (rigatoni and spaghetti) and fish (salmon and brontizi), I would highly recommend the "Middle Eastern" inspired dishes.
- Appetizers: hummus and roasted eggplant with your choice of sauces, plain, garlic or spicy are served with warm pita bread.
 - Entrees: the vegetarian entrees are excellent, vegetarian combo platter
- Gives a nice sampling of the local ingredients; the couscous offers a bowl of vegetables in a hearty tomato sauce.
- For the less adventurous the chicken, lamb or beef kebab served with rice and grilled veggies will not disappoint.
 - Desserts: try the baklava
 - Drinks: Lebanese beer (Almaza), Lebanese wine white or red

Walkers and Talkers: **TAD LARRABEE** reported that the walkers enjoyed an early Spring Day starting at the Manursing Island Club in Rye, NY on Thursday, April 20th. The entrance road to the club had a spectacular display of daffodils for over a half mile. Early in their walk, they came to a road that led to the old Tide Mill which had many "No Admittance" signs, but they wanted to see this historic spot, so they wandered in. As they arrived, the owner of the mill came out, wondering why they were there, but instead of chastising the group, he gave them a 15-minute tour of the old mill. It was delightful!



• The Tide Mill was a very rare mill that was powered by the tides, so it had a very reliable year-round grinding capacity. In 1770, the early owners purchased the small islands around Hyatt's Cove and built 3 dams and the Mill building. Unique to this Mill were the special gears and the two stone wheels which were turned by both the incoming and outgoing tidewater which ran what were called four "run of stones" to grind grain. The actual operation depended on the twice daily tide admitted into the pond impounded in Long Island Sound behind a sluice gate which powered a large waterwheel. Five or six hours' grinding could be managed with each tide. The miller slept in a wing of the Mill and his work hours were scheduled around the tides. An alarm was even rigged to work when the tide was low, awakening the miller so as to not miss the opportunity to grind grain whenever the best opportunity arose. Grain was brought from as far away as Virginia and Georgia as well as Long Island.

• The mill's history states that, during the American Revolution, the English Army, having walked across a frozen Long Island Sound, camped out "by thee ol' red Mill" prior to their attack on Greenwich. The property is now known as the Tide Mill Yacht Basin.

After this interesting interruption to the walk, the group proceeded to explore Kirby Lane North in Rye where in the 1950's, a group of progressives from New York City came as a group to establish their own community and build some communal facilities such as a still-used swimming pool. It was known for its left-wing tendencies and nick-named "Red Hill" for its supposed "communist leanings." Many modern homes make it an interesting architectural site. Again, they accidentally met a local resident who shared his thoughts on this unique street.

TODAY'S SPEAKER

This week's speaker was Robert Wolterstorff, Ph.D, executive director of The Bruce Museum. His presentation was, "The New Bruce Museum: A World Class Destination for Art, Culture, and Science Education."

Dr. Wolterstorff joined the Bruce in 2019, after a 27-year career in the arts and museum leadership. He has held curatorial and research positions, most recently at the Bennington Museum in Vermont, and earlier at the Philadelphia Museum of Art, the Clark Art Institute, the Williams College Museum of Art and the college's Chapin Rare Book Library. He served as a trustee for the New England Museum Association from 2006 to 2015. Wolterstorff earned a Master of Fine Arts and a Doctorate in Art History from Princeton University. He has a Masters in Art History from Williams College and a Bachelor's degree in biology from

Calvin College in Grand Rapids, Michigan. It is fitting that a museum that combines Art and Science should have someone with Dr. Wolterstorff's diverse background in both these disciplines.



The new Bruce, that just opened on April 2nd, has more than doubled the size of the museum, adding 43,000 square feet, that features a façade of glass and cast stone, inspired by the striated surfaces of Connecticut's rock quarries. The centerpiece of the new Bruce is the Richter wing, a three-story, \$67MM addition--funded privately by people in the Greenwich community-that is integrated with the current structure. "Today, it's about a new building, but it's also about a bigger

concept," says Dr. Wolterstorff. "It's a new Bruce, a completely re-imagined, re-invented Bruce Museum."

The new Richter Wing provides community spaces and embeds the museum in Bruce Park nature and community as never before. The new main entrance faces Museum Drive and is completely re-oriented to and integrated into the park. The community spaces on the new ground floor, entered from the park, are free to visitors. There is onsite dining for the first time, an expanded Lecture Hall (now 250 seats), a larger Museum Store, and a Conference Room. Science exhibitions and education classrooms have been expanded to entirely occupy the old museum space.

Dr. Wolterstorff's talk exuded his excitement at finally seeing the museum fully accessible to the public and hosting thousands of visitors. It has opened to rave reviews, including in the New York Times and Wall Street Journal, and is attracting attention from all over the New York to New Haven region. It simply has exceeded expectations.

There are four pillars to the Bruce's new mission: Community, Art, Science, and Education. All four elements of the mission are served by the new building. The ground floor is entirely community space. The second floor has storage space, a conference room and a woodshop. The third floor consists of five permanent galleries, both art and science together. The galleries house impressionist and modern art, sculptures, a stunning mineral exhibit, and a changing science exhibit, which is currently about penguins. A

beautiful wide staircase connects the floors, passes under a Gabriel Dodd creation featuring thousands of beautiful colored threads, and faces an open inner court which provides natural light and a green space.

The education wing is housed in what used to be the front of the old building. The new Bruce does education every day and is drawing students from Fairfield and Westchester Counties. With the expanded classroom space and the new galleries, the Bruce expects to double the number of students educated at museum, from the 26,000 a year that were being served before the pandemic.

Dr. Wolterstorff said that as beautiful as the building is, it is "ultimately a tool to do good work in the world". He feels that the Bruce expansion will ultimately be judged by how we use the building". He expressed the view that "We want a noisy, active, busy museum, where people encounter art, science and ideas, and each other."

The Bruce is a great gift to the Greenwich community, one that we can all enjoy for years to come.
