President **JACK WEIR** opened the meeting promptly at 9:45, and introduced **MIKE HAYDEN** who led us in the Pledge. **JERRY SCHWENDEMAN** then led the singing, with **JIM SANTORA** at the piano. Today's patriotic song was "My Country 'Tis of Thee," followed by the tunes "On the Sunny Side of the Street" and "Alexander's Ragtime Band."

JACK reminded us that our dues checks, made out to RMA for \$100, may be mailed to Treasurer **JEFF JUNKER** (9 Treetop Terrace, Greenwich, CT 06831). There will be no RMA meeting on August 2nd due to Vacation Bible School at the church.

Corresponding Secretary **ARNOLD GORDON** told us an interesting story involving Connecticut history. (For a complete history of the State, see

<https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Connecticut>). Although some Dutch explorers preceded the English by many years, Connecticut began as a real colony circa 1636, formed by Puritans from the Massachusetts Bay Colony; it was centered at what is now Hartford, with several settlements around the territory. CT was not admitted to the Union until 1788, as the 5th state. It is not commonly known that between 1647 and 1697 twenty-seven women and 7 men were indicted for the alleged crime of witchcraft. Twelve were convicted and all but one were executed by hanging. As in the notorious Salem Witch Trials in Massachusetts, the accusations had often been unfounded and based upon misogyny. The others who were indicted were either forced to flee or were banished. Even those who were acquitted had their reputations destroyed and their family names tarnished. Now, 326 years later, our stalwart CT Legislators conscientiously introduced a resolution (in February) to clear the names of those accused of "witchcraft" and "familiarities with the devil." This resolution (CT House Resolution 34) passed on May 10th. The Resolution reads "The State of Connecticut apologizes to the descendants of all those who were indicted, convicted and executed and for the harm done to the accused persons' posterity to the present day, and acknowledges the trauma and shame that wrongfully continued to affect the families of the accused." Their reputations are now restored and no longer have disgrace attached to their names, and are in good standing in Connecticut. ARNOLD also reported on the Greenwich Vietnam-Era Veterans Awards Ceremony held at the Arch Street Teen Center on Monday afternoon, May 15. In attendance were 90 veterans with family and friends in a crowd of more than 200. Organized and chaired by Lt. Governor Susan Bysiewicz, it was one of many such gracious events held in towns throughout Connecticut. It was an impressive and often moving ceremony, with a tribute to the 24 Greenwich residents who were killed in Vietnam. Comments were made by our local politicians (Fred Camillo and RMA members **STEVE MESKERS** and **HECTOR ARZENO**) and the head of the State Department of Veterans Affairs. Several other RMA members were there, including **MIKE AMBROSINO**, **SKIP AUCH**, **ARNOLD GORDON**, **KEATING HAGMAN**, **RICK HOLZ** and **RON WILSON**. Several veterans came to the mike with accounts of their Vietnam experiences, including our very own **MIKE AMBROSINO**. Each veteran was given a certificate signed by the Lt. Governor in honor of their patriotic service, as well as a lapel pin commemorating the 50th anniversary of the end of the war. A published account of the event can be found here:

Door to a birthing room: "Push, push, push."

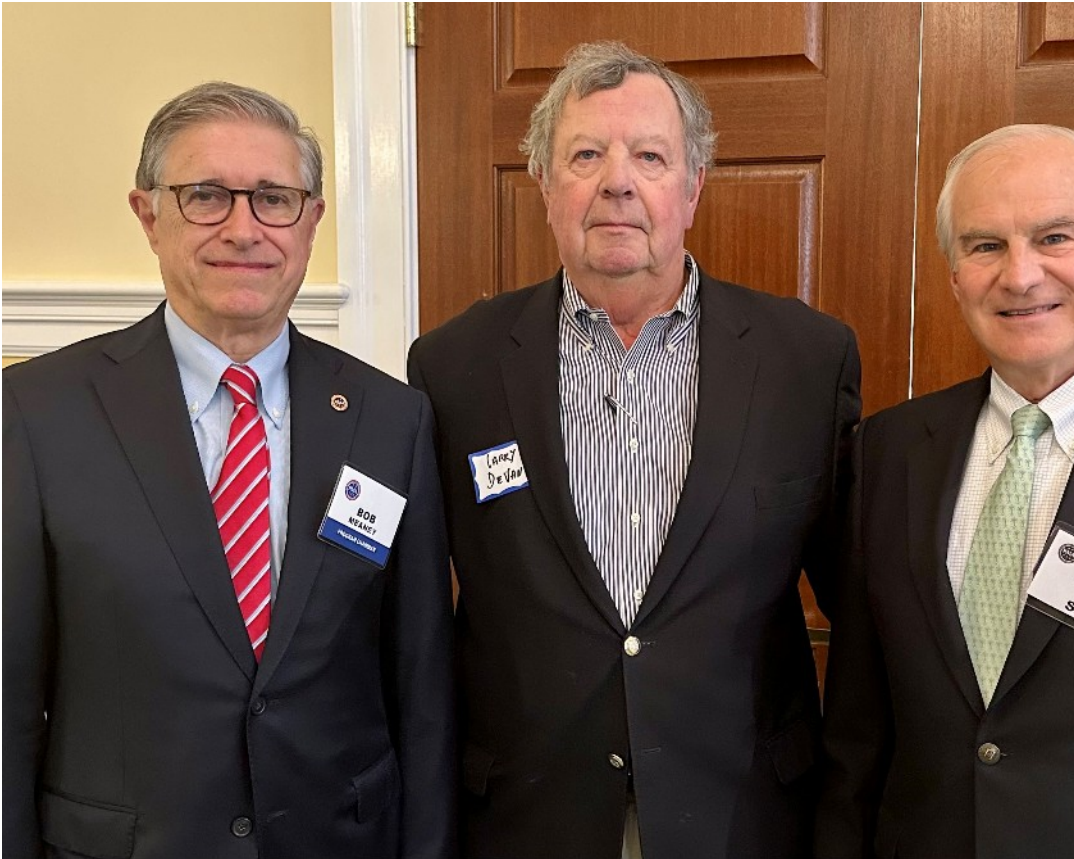
Veterinarian: "Sit. Stay."

THIS WEEK'S SPEAKER: **BOB MEANEY** previewed the talk of Dr. Pete McCornick, Executive Director of the Daugherty Water-Food Institute at the University of Nebraska, where he is a tenured professor in the Department of Biosystems Engineering. Noting that

only 3 per cent of the world's water is fresh, and that 70% of that is used for agricultural purposes, Dr. McCornick will describe his Institute's work around the world in preserving and husbanding our planet's water resources.

HUMAN INTEREST STORY

HORST TEBBE rose to inform us of the spectacular performance of Mozart's "Don Giovanni" at the Metropolitan Opera. In **HORST's** opinion, the Met's previous attempts at this opera over the years had been less than stellar. But this one garnered a spontaneous and excited standing ovation. SPEAKER PROGRAM

RMA member **BOB MEANY** introduced Peter McCornick, Ph.D., tenured professor in the Department of Biosystems Engineering at the University of Nebraska. Professor McCornick holds masters and doctorate degrees from Colorado State University; he is Executive Director of the Daugherty Water for Food Global Institute (DWFI). Prior to joining DWFI, he was the deputy director general of research at the International Water Management Institute. With an international career focused on sustainable management of water resources, he has led research and implemented programs on water, agriculture and the environment in Africa, Asia, the Middle East and North America.

Dr. McCornick delivered his lecture on "Water and Food Security in a Changing World" with a pleasantly light Scottish brogue. He began by pointing out that the current world population of eight billion is expected to reach ten billion by 2050, with twenty per cent of those people living in sub-Saharan Africa. At that time, it is estimated that one billion people will be suffering from food insecurity. The many drivers of such adverse changes include climate, extreme events, conflicts, trade markets and, notably, degradation of the quantity and quality of water resources.

The audience then viewed a brief video describing the work of the Daugherty Institute at the University of Nebraska. The Institute's vision is to have a lasting and secure positive impact on the world's water and food resources. Global water security implies availability and accessibility for water management and maintenance of quality and safety. Crop production consumes seventy per cent of global fresh water use. Need and usage vary from year to year and from season to season.

Dr. McCornick used the example of Nebraska as a "living lab" to illustrate his message. Surface irrigation systems using the Platte River Basin and the Ogallala Aquifer were developed over a hundred years ago. It is now the largest irrigated area in the U.S. Currently, seven-eighths of Nebraska's land is sustainably irrigated by groundwater. And the levels of groundwater have remained relatively stable for two decades. Management, especially in dry areas, is tight and is overseen by boards and peer groups from the community.

The situations on other continents were then illustrated. In Asia, the Ganges River is a "water machine" which floods annually. During the dry season, pumping of water is active. India has over twenty million wells. There are millions of small-scale farms. But overuse has been depleting the groundwater, and there is a need for reform. In Africa, Rwanda has a history of low-producing small farmers. With sub-Saharan Africa's population expected to double by 2050, this area will not be able to meet its food needs by managing rainwater. Only five per cent of arable land in Africa is irrigated. The Nebraska contingent has been working with Rwanda to improve "farmer led irrigation." In South America, the Bahia area of Brazil has a large but under-utilized groundwater resource, but there is little government support of farmers.

Dr. McCornick feels that much has been achieved by efforts like those of the Water for Food Institute. Additional robust institutions are needed, and their progress needs to be publicized. Even more important are leadership and solutions at the local level. A brief Q and A ensued, covering such topics as desalinization, recycling and drip irrigation.
