HOLLISTER STURGES stated that today's speaker would be art authority Page Knox on "Van Gogh's Cypresses."

GEORGE UBOGY announced that his wife Jo would be next week's speaker. She will give a talk entitled "Raising Monarchs (Observations of a Would-Be Naturalist)." Jo is an artist, avid gardener and self-taught naturalist. She tells how she grew milkweed from seed and was rewarded to find tiny green and black caterpillars on the undersurface of their leaves. She harvested the caterpillars, kept them supplied with milkweed and with moisture and was able to teach herself how to keep them protected from predatory wasps, film them and observe their transition from the larval stage (caterpillars) to pupae (chrysalis) to adults (monarch butterflies). She also learned more about their migratory patterns, environmental threats, their endangered species status, how to distinguish male from female butterflies and how to place them on food (nectar) once they have hatched. She will share this knowledge and the films she has taken with the audience.

HUMAN INTEREST STORY

ANDRE MAZUREK gave us a wonderful presentation, including beautiful pictures of the six week, 10,000 km trip that he and his beautiful wife, Carolina, and their stalwart dog, Rocky, took through Europe. They visited 13 cities in 12 countries, including Warsaw and Krakow in Poland; Vilnius, Lithuania; Riga, Latvia; Tallinn, Estonia; Helsinki, Finland; Stockholm, Sweden; Copenhagen, Denmark; Berlin, Germany; Prague, Czech Republic; Vienna, Austria; Budapest, Hungary; and Bratislava, Slovakia. They met great people, ate delicious food, saw some wonderful sights, took in beautiful scenery, and visited some remarkable cultural sites. The cities they visited were rich in history. They visited medieval and restored cities, mixed with modern business centers and high rises. And they did all this with just one suitcase.

FEATURED SPEAKER PRESENTATION

HOLLISTER STURGES introduced this week's speaker, Dr. Page Knox, who is both a contractual adjunct professor in the Art History Department of Columbia University as well as a contractual lecturer and educator at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. She earned her BA in Art History from Yale University and her Ph.D. in Art History from Columbia University in 2012. She works in a variety of capacities at the Met, teaching classes, and

giving public gallery talks and lectures on special exhibitions and the permanent collection. She is also highly active leading trips for "Travel with the Met," including the following tours:

- "Raphael, Defining Beauty in Renaissance Italy," from Florence to Rome.
- "Met Classics," Rome.
- "Met Classics," Madrid.
- "Great Artists-Caravaggio, Master of Light & Shadow," from Rome to Malta.

Dr. Knox's presentation to the RMA was entitled "Van Gogh's Cypresses." Her talk centered around a sample of his work that was explored in a recent exhibition at the Met, which featured his paintings of these ancient trees, including classics such as *Starry Night* and *Wheat Fields with Cypresses*. Vincent Van Gogh created some of the most iconic images of the south of France, capturing the region's distinctive landscape which both inspired and astonished him, leading him to paint an exceptional body of work devoted to its golden wheatfields and colorful gardens, as well as its stately cypress trees.



Dr. Knox provided the RMA membership with a detailed review of Van Gogh's life, paintings, drawings, and letters. Her presentation integrated the specifics of his life, his early failures, his battle with mental illness and his eventual triumph as an artist. We know a great deal about his life from the letters he and his brother, Theo, exchanged throughout their lives. The letters give us an insight into what he was thinking and what was influencing his life and life decisions. We know that his mother pushed him to draw

and spend time outside appreciating natural beauty. We also know that he had a difficult relationship with his father, who was a preacher. Van Gogh clearly lacked direction and focus in his early adult life, which dismayed his family. He returned from boarding school without graduating; he was fired by his uncle from his art dealership; his effort to be a teacher and also a preacher failed as he was again fired. But in time, he gradually became interested in painting and began developing a body of work that he would build on over time.

His brother, Theo, became a player in the art world. He exposed Vincent to contemporary, Dutch, and Japanese art, all of which eventually influenced his work. He eventually moved to the south of France in Arles and continued his work painting, partnering for a brief time with Gaugin, who criticized him for not being more imaginative in his work. It was at this point that Van Gogh's loneliness and mental illness deteriorated to the point that he put himself into a sanitorium.

Ironically, during this time in the hospital in Saint Remy, he did some of his most famous work. He painted natural scenes that he could see outside his room window, in the courtyards, and the surrounding fields. During his recovery, he also developed the ability to paint from images in his mind and became more creative in his use of color. Van Gogh was drawn particularly to the cypress as a symbol of the natural world and the spiritual realm. Many of his most famous paintings depicted the landscapes of Arles and Saint Rémy during the final years of his life.

In 1890, he was recognized by Albert Aurier, a French poet, art critic and painter, who took an interest in his landscape paintings and began to write articles about him. This publicity got him recognized as an artist and led to his finally having an exhibition of his work.

In the final months of his life, while he was living in Auvers-sur-oise near his psychiatrist, he entered his most creative and energetic period. He painted 70 paintings in 70 days and some of his most famous work. How Van Gogh died, whether by his own hand or a shotgun accident, is a matter of much debate. But, nonetheless, it is a sad reality, that his life ended too early and that he never had a chance to fully realize the fruits of his tremendous artistic accomplishments.
