JOHN KAVANAGH then began the induction ceremony for prospective new member Michael Brown. Sponsor KEATING HAGMANN nominated Michael for membership with a brief biography. Michael was born British but is now an American citizen. Although he left school at 16, he became a chartered accountant. He served in the 12th Royal Lancers, an armored reconnaissance regiment, and joined a major manufacturing group, working

extensively in Africa. Later he joined *Times Newspaper* in London as business director. From there he became president of Thomson Publishing, restructuring the company and moving the headquarters to the US. Thomson Reuters is now in Stamford. Michael has served on several non-profit boards dealing with environmental issues and medical research. He is highly knowledgeable of food and wine. He is a widower, with two daughters and two grandchildren. **BOB CURRY** seconded the nomination. **JOHN** called for a show of hands vote which was unanimous in favor of inducting **MICHAEL**, who then made some brief acceptance remarks.

JOHN announced that there were three guests at the meeting, Peter Mougros, guest of **SPIKE LIPSCHUTZ**, Larry Allen, guest of **BILL FEATHERSTON** and **TOG PEARSON**, and Joe Waide, guest of **GERRY BOYLE** and **BRIAN O'CONNOR**. Speaker Program: STEVE MYERS announced Christopher Shays as our speaker today, with a talk entitled "We Have a Democracy If We Can Keep It." **GEORGE UBOGY** announced that next week we will have our possibly first ever talk about mental health. The speaker will be Dr. Jerome Brodlie talking about PTSD, and the title of the talk is "Best Practices for Treating Catastrophic Post-Traumatic Stress Syndrome."

Technology: JOHN REESE gave a report for the RMA Technology Group. There are two such groups. The first is for any members interested in artificial intelligence, and met just recently on Zoom. The second group is exploring the use of technology by the RMA. One topic is use of electronic payment systems such as PayPal and Zelle for payments from members to the RMA. The team also explored the preference of members on paying via credit card as compared to direct debits. The team is struggling with the cost associated with accepting credit cards, which is approximately 4%. Furthermore, the RMA team is planning to experiment with AI summaries of the meetings and is seeking interested members for an internal committee.

ALAN GUNZBERG described a program of vision testing of elementary school students. The Greenwich Lions will visit 11 elementary schools in the Town of Greenwich performing vision screening eyes of first, second, fourth, and fifth graders. We have completed screenings at the following schools: North Mianus Elementary school, Hamilton Avenue Elementary school, New Lebanon Elementary school, and Julian Curtis Elementary school. Next Tuesday we will be at Parkway Elementary school. To date we have screened approximately 750 students and referred 110 students for further treatment by a professional.

JIM DEAN gave an update on the recruitment of volunteers for the Salvation Army kettle program. They need volunteers to take 30-day enlistments (and avoid the draft!). And if you attended that concert, you know how great the GSO has become under the baton of Stuart Malina. Walkers and Talkers: TAD LARRABEE. We met at the Cos Cob Library and first walked a loop to the north on local roads then through the southernmost part of Montgomery Pinetum and out through Pomerance Park and back to central Cos Cob via Sinawoy Road where some walkers peeled off to their cars. Several walkers took another mile-long loop around Mill Pond in south Cos Cob. It was a comfortable overcast day, good

for a walk. When we finished and were talking before driving home, a light sprinkle began – our timing was impeccable!

TODAY'S SPEAKER

STEVE MYERS introduced former US Congressman Christopher Shays. Christopher represented the 4th District of Connecticut from 1987 to 2009. A moderate Republican, socially progressive and fiscally conservative, Shays had a strong and successful record of reaching across the aisle to address our nation's problems. After Congress, Shays co-chaired the Commission on Wartime Contracting, then served as a distinguished fellow in public service at the University of New Haven, and later as a resident fellow at the Institute of Politics at Harvard Kennedy School. Shays is a graduate of Principia College, NYU's Stern School of Business (MBA), and its Wagner School of Public Administration (MPA).

Shays always had wanted to serve in government. He recalled joining the *Weekly Reader* program, from which he learned about great people in American history. Shays also recalled that every day his dad read newspapers on the train, and would ask him what he thought about issues. By the time he got to college he knew he wanted to run for Congress.

Shays says that when he was running for office, his philosophy was: if you win, be an inspiring, hard-working leader; if you lose, congratulate the winner and encourage your supporters to respect the outcome of the election. In 1974 he went door-to-door talking to people in the 4th Congressional District. Once he came to a home that he knew was owned by a Democrat and in his mind he had a stereotypical image of her. But her primary complaint was about programs that waste money. Later he met an elder Republican man living in a stately home. Although the man deplored all the waste in government, it bothered him that there are so many poor people living in downtown Stamford. These are examples of experiences that influenced him to become a fiscally conservative but socially moderate politician.



For Shays, one of the best things about being an elected official was exposure to different viewpoints. His staff had set up a meeting with a prostitute to discuss her efforts to stop the spread of AIDS. A person of color weighing 250 pounds, she made him laugh, and they kept talking long after the allotted time. She agreed to attend a polo match with him in north Greenwich. At the match he saw a sign for a fundraiser for people afflicted with AIDS. For Shays, this

demonstrated how people of wildly different backgrounds can work toward the same goals.

How do you represent people with widely diverging opinions? Shays says his job was to understand why people think as they do. When in Congress, he often did things that differed from what he had promised while campaigning. Why? Because he listened to people, learned from them, and considered their opinions.

The founding fathers crafted the Constitution through compromise, and the Constitution is designed to encourage compromise. Elected officials should fight for what they believe, but also be open compromise. Unfortunately, the Electoral College system can allow the

presidential candidate with fewer votes to win. The filibuster allows one member to shut down the entire Senate. Gerrymandering has created districts that are not competitive. This has led to a Congress that is not representative of the people, and populated by extremists on both sides.

In response to a wide variety of questions from the audience, Shays touched on many topics. When asked what should be done about the Electoral College system, Shays said that it should be improved by allowing each district to select its own candidate, rather than giving all of a state's votes to the winner.

Since Reagan, the national debt has grown from one trillion to 33 trillion dollars. Although Shays is a Republican, he feels that most Republican politicians' advocacy of cutting taxes is the wrong approach when we have such a huge national debt.

In addition to the effects of gerrymandering, Shays also described the pressures on Congresspeople to abandon moderate stances. For example, he was told that if he championed campaign finance reform, he would not be chosen to lead the government oversight committee. When Shays voted to allow school choice in the District of Columbia, the NEA told him they would campaign against him.

Shays said that today he is proud to be called a RINO (Republican in Name Only), because the Republican party has changed so much. Shays bemoaned the things Trump said about General Milley and the soldiers buried in WWII cemeteries in Europe or in Arlington Cemetery.

Audience member (and state representative) **HECTOR ARZENO**, a Democrat, related a story about telling a reporter that the politician he most admires is Chris Shays. The reporter asked him if was aware that Shays was a Republican, and **ARZENO** said that didn't matter.

In the current crisis of leadership in the House of Representatives, Shays said that if he were in office he would get a small group of Republicans to meet with Democrats to choose a speaker who will lead from the middle. That would leave out the extreme rightwing of the House. He doesn't know where the Republican Party is going; he is hoping a

third-party candidate emerges because that is the only thing that will get Republicans back in line.
