ARNOLD described a moving volunteer experience that he had in joining his son's team for the Walk to End Alzheimer's at Calf Pasture Beach in Norwalk on a sunny Sunday, October 8. It is held annually in more than 600 communities nationwide. It was the 30th year for this amazing event in Norwalk, which raises money for Alzheimer's disease

research. About six million people suffer from the disease in the US, with 80,000 in CT. At the first Norwalk event, there were only 150 people who raised \$5,000; yesterday's event was attended by about 1,000 people of all persuasions. The event raised over \$400,000. Present at tables spread around the park were representatives from many mental healthcare service providers and other facilities, including from places like Edgehill, whose team raised \$53,000, the highest of all the teams. There was entertainment, including by the Greenwich High School cheerleaders, the Fairfield High School drama group who performed music from *Les Miserables*, and other teenage groups. Donated refreshments were available. Following some brief speeches, including one by Senator Richard Blumenthal, everyone went on the 2.5 mile walk as the finale. It was inspiring to see so many devoted people, young and old, who came together with such great commitment and energy to recognize and work toward a common goal for a very important cause. Forgive the political jab, but it should serve as a model for a certain government body in D.C.

BOB MEANEY then advised that this week's speaker will be Mark Perlman, who wrote *The Reluctant Soldier*. Mr. Perlman has graciously agreed to speak in place of the scheduled speaker, Dr. Jerome Brodlie, who had to cancel on short notice. Mr. Perlman's historical novel has been called "a wonderful mix of history and fiction about WWI, the interwar years in Paris, and WWII." Ms. Appel served as the Senior Vice President of Development at The New School and Associate Dean of Development at Bouve College of Health Sciences at Northeastern University in Boston. Ms. Appel will speak about Greenwich Hospital's recently launched capital campaign.

TIM BROOKS was invited to the podium to report on the Publicity Committee initiative to contribute a regular RMA column to the *Greenwich Sentinel*, which reaches 20,000 subscribers each week. He thanked the scribes who write up the talks given by our speakers every week, and **FRED WU** and **FRANK SCARPA** for being the two scribes who take those summaries and modify them for submission to the *Sentinel*. He also read a letter published in the *Sentinel* thanking the RMA for this "community service." **TIM** asked those

DON ROTZEIN announced the ROMEO lunch is ON for Friday, October 13. Members will meet at the picnic area behind the main concession stand at Greenwich Point at 1:00 pm. He reminded all to bring their beach card, but if without one, come anyway and tell the guard that you are with the RMA ROMEO lunch group. Bring lunch and maybe a jacket. That day is also the 69th anniversary of RMA being founded.

JIM FISHBEIN gave a human-interest report on astronomy. JIM talked about "Space Telescopes and their Amazing Mirrors" with images he obtained from NASA. He showed a chart of milestones in telescope development starting with Galileo in 1609 with two lenses which were two to four inches in diameter, followed by Newton who in 1672 created a reflecting telescope which had a longer focal length and had a mirror that was four to 10 inches in diameter. Eventually, the largest telescopes on earth were the Mount Wilson telescope which is 100 inches in diameter and the Palomar telescope, which is 200 inches. These were the biggest sizes that could be manufactured. Finally, telescopes were launched into space, including the Hubble telescope that was launched in 1990 and it is still there. The Hubble telescope is also 8 feet in diameter and was followed by the James Webb telescope which is 21.3 feet and was put into space in 2021, complete with a sun shield the size of a tennis court that keeps the sun from burning up the telescope. JIM

went through the critical steps of polishing the mirrors on a telescope. **JIM** finished with an image from the Webb telescope that shows a star being born. He urged us to go to the NASA website for more pictures.

BOB MEANEY introduced this week's speaker, Mark Perlman, who spoke about his book *The Reluctant Soldier*. Mr. Perlman has called this historical novel "a wonderful mix of history and fiction about WWI, the interwar years in Paris, and WWII." The book sets out the experiences, both good and laced with discrimination, of a fictional African American soldier.

The Reluctant Soldier follows the adventures and misadventures of Virgil Carpenter, an African American teacher at the City College of

New York in the early 1900s, who becomes an unwitting combatant in World War I and joins the famous Negro regiment, the 369th Infantry Regiment, nicknamed "The Harlem"

Hellfighters." His fictionalized story draws him into the most important events of the twentieth century. After the war Virgil becomes an expatriate in Paris during the exciting "jazz era" of the interwar period and meets famous expatriates such as Josephine Baker, Ernest Hemingway, Eugene Bullard and Sylvia Beach, to name a few. When World War II breaks out, he is recruited into the intrigue of the French Resistance. The interwar period in Paris provides a vivid backdrop to Virgil's traumatic and complicated life. Racial segregation and prejudice faced by African Americans are an integral part of American history. This novel addresses this difficult legacy. It also addresses the slow, but steady progress of Black minorities to be accepted and valued in the complex American culture.

Mark Perlman is a resident of Fairfield County, Conn. He has a passion for military history that has taken him to the battle fields and cemeteries of France. The French language version of *The Reluctant Soldier* has been published in Europe under the title *Le Soldat Involontaire*.
