### HUMAN INTEREST: TAD LARRABEE

"My Unexpected Justification for Solar Panels"

I have been concerned about environmental issues for a long time. At our home, we had a large ash tree shading our roof, making solar unacceptable. When that tree succumbed to the emerald ash beetle in August 2018, the tree had to come down. I could finally focus on the possibility of solar energy, but my reasoning continued to be that it was justified from an environmental viewpoint even if it was costly. And I wanted to gain the benefits of the soon-to-expire state and federal incentives. Once installed in December 2018, our total net cost basis for a full south-facing roof of 35 solar panels was about \$28,000. We have an all-electric home, including heating, which allowed us to install the CT-limited maximum number of solar panels. Unfortunately, limits on the qualifying number of solar panels is a legislated restriction that benefits the electric utilities, not the environment, but that should be no surprise!

The CT Green Bank provided an interest free loan for the full amount of our investment with very generous terms. I paid the bank roughly the same amount each month that I had previously paid to Eversource, so it did not affect our budget at all. And that loan has been paid so that expense has disappeared.

In retrospect, and much to my surprise, I now consider this investment to be part of our retirement investment portfolio in addition to being environmentally sound. It is very much like investing in a risk-free and completely market-stable bond that initially returned around 8% to 9% per year. It never matures so I won't need to bother with reinvestment at maturity. And the "income"-equivalent is not taxed; it just lowers my expenses. I challenge you to find a similarly generous bond investment! It can't be called and it carries no market risk. And as a result of the recent increases in electricity rates, and projected future increases, our real rate of return has increased significantly although I have not recalculated our new, higher rate of return. However, it is probably over 15%. In my lifetime, I have never known of another bond-like investment that offers anything like these long-term financial benefits – and all while having a positive environmental impact. I am very satisfied with our investment even though solar technology is improving which makes current solar systems even more beneficial while perhaps providing an even better return on investment, depending on government incentives. Viewed as a part of our total investment portfolio, it is perhaps our best long-term investment!

But there's more! Our real estate taxes, by law, cannot be increased due to our installation of solar panels. Granted I can't sell this bond-equivalent investment like a normal bond, but I have also been advised by real estate agents that our solar panels have increased the value of our home by roughly \$50,000. Not bad for our investment of half that amount.

Another side benefit is that the solar panels provide shade with air flow under them that keeps our roof much cooler, reducing our air conditioning demand and extending the life expectancy of our roof. I also get a kick when "gassing up" our Prius Hybrid with free, home-generated solar energy using a standard home plug. Our local driving is electric, resulting in an average of around 200 miles per-gallon. The price of the limited electricity that we purchase from Eversource via the electric grid at night or during the winter is the same as the price that we receive from Eversource for selling our excess solar-generated electricity to them. It is not yet economically beneficial to install full battery backup, but that may change with new technologies and incentives in CT which is attempting to reduce costly peak demand production of electricity which has the worst environmental impact. Our solar reports indicate that we have saved over 117,000 pounds of CO2 emissions so far, the equivalent of planting about 886 trees!

I chose a solar company that I believed would be around for the long term. This is a very important consideration relative to changing technology since many companies in the business ten years ago are no longer around. If you ever need repairs, companies may not wish to deal with another vendor's product. Our initial vendor is now owned by Con Edison and the industry is stabilizing. We have had no problems or issues since installation. My next project is to investigate new technologies to replace our old air conditioning system with geothermal and/or heat pump systems. This should significantly reduce our current air conditioning costs and its carbon footprint. It may also provide some additional heating and perhaps reduce the electricity required by our hot water heater. Our total energy approach may substantially increase our return on investment. Time will tell.

#### **TODAY'S SPEAKER**

**SPIKE LIPSCHUTZ** introduced today's speaker, Sunil Saksena, a past president of the Darien Retired Men's Association. Mr. Saksena was born in 1944, and received his bachelor's degree from an engineering college in India. He subsequently earned a master's degree and an MBA from the University of California, Berkeley. He has had an illustrious

career in international finance (including Fidelity Funds) and industry (including the American Can Company). Mr. Saksena speaks to us today about the Presidential Election of 1876, arguably the most controversial in American history. (Lawyers for Donald Trump studied this election and may have been influenced by it.)



The electoral contest of November 7, 1876, was between Rutherford B. Hayes, Republican of Ohio, and Samuel J. Tilden, Democrat of New York. The roots of this election can be traced back to the assassination of Abraham Lincoln in 1865 and the Reconstruction Era that followed, with its violence against the Negro population, including the origin of the KKK in 1866. Republicans had won every presidential election since Lincoln. Although Lincoln's Vice

President and successor Andrew Johnson had been impeached, Ulysses Grant restored a modicum of order by 1876, with his passionate defense of civil rights. However, between 1872 and 1876, there had been a gradual takeover of the southern states by white Democrats who wanted to roll back Black civil rights gains. In the campaign for the 1876 election, Democrats emphasized the scandals of the recent Republican administration (the "Black Friday Gold Scandal" and the "Credit Mobilier" scandal), whereas Republicans pointed to Democrats as having caused the Civil War and threatening to disenfranchise Blacks.

The candidates: Rutherford Hayes was an Ohioan with a Harvard law degree--a respected Union Army Veteran, who had served three terms as Ohio's governor. He was a moderate Republican with a clean reputation, but virtually unknown outside Ohio. Samuel Tilden was a native of upstate New York who had dropped out of Yale but ultimately received a law degree from New York University. He had an anti-slavery and anti-corruption record and had been elected Governor of New York in 1860. The campaigns of both sides were surprisingly similar, with bilateral mudslinging.

The election: Turnout was exceptionally high, with 82 per cent of eligible voters participating. By midnight of Election Day, Tilden had captured 184 electoral votes and

Hayes had won 165 (185 were needed to clinch a victory.) Twenty undecided votes were spread among four states: Florida (4), Louisiana (8), South Carolina (7) and Oregon (1). Although the initial impression was of a landslide victory for Tilden, the Hayes contingent refused to concede. Under the instigation of Retired General Daniel Sickles, the four states sent duplicate sets of electors to Washington, amid charges of widespread Black voter suppression in the South. The Republican-dominated state electoral commissions ultimately rejected enough Democrat votes to post their electoral votes to Hayes, who was awarded the win by a margin of one electoral vote. He was inaugurated on March 7, 1877.

Mr. Saksena provided meticulous details of this convoluted decision, replete with contemporary pictures of political posters and cartoons. His presentation was thorough, scholarly and enlightening.
