PARKING PERMIT ANNOUNCEMENT

PETER reminded us that new yellow, numbered parking permits will be available only in person and at the meeting between 9 and 9:45. We were reminded that parking places in the Lafayette lot are usually fully occupied by 9:30.

Speakers Program. BOB MEANEY announced that today's speaker is very well known to us. As he did last year, **DAVID MICHONSKI** will provide us with his analysis of price and other trends within the Greenwich real estate market over the past 18 months. **DAVID** is a real estate executive with more than 30 years of experience in local, national and international markets. He has served as chairman of international operations for the National Association of Realtors and has been a real estate advisor to the US State Department. He has also managed the Greenwich office of Coldwell Banker.

BOB continued that our speaker next Wednesday will be Stuart Reid, the author of *The Lumumba Plot: The Secret History of the CIA and a Cold War Assassination.* Just published last year, this is the dramatic story of the early days of Congo's independence from Belgium. The Democratic Republic of the Congo is the second-largest country in Africa. It is rich in natural resources, and its rainforest serves as one of the world's largest carbon sinks. You may remember as a youngster hearing about Congo's independence celebrations in June, 1960, and the political upheavals that followed. The first prime minister was Patrice Lumumba, a young and charismatic leader who ran into fierce resistance at home and abroad. You might have heard on the news names like Lumumba, Mobutu, and Dag Hammarskjöld. They were all players in a story that is really about the Cold War and US concerns about Russia influencing African leaders. Stuart Reid, a Dartmouth graduate and currently Executive Editor of *Foreign Affairs Magazine*, will educate us on what has been discovered about this time of trouble in the Congo.

Special Events. FRED WU reported that the next Greenwich Symphony Orchestra concerts are coming up this weekend, featuring Fauré's *Pelléas et Melisandre* and Weill's *Symphony No. 2*, but the main attraction is Rachmaninoff's *Piano Concerto No. 3*. This piece is very popular for good reason; it is both melodic and dramatic. It is also very difficult to perform. In 1996 a movie called *Shine* was released; it told the story of a young man who becomes obsessed with mastering the "Rach 3." We are fortunate to have George Li to perform it. Li won the silver medal at the International Tchaikovsky Competition in 2015 and at the age of 28 already has an international reputation. If you don't already have plans for this weekend, come to one of the concerts at 7:30 Saturday or 3:00 Sunday at the Performing Arts Center at Greenwich High School.

DON ROTZIEN announced that the next ROMEO Lunch will take place at Sally's Pizza on Summer Street in Stamford at 1:00 pm on Thursday, March 7. All are welcome, just bring your credit card and appetite. There is parking across the street. We look forward to seeing you there!

PETE UHRY'S HISTORICAL QUIZ

Past Prez **PETE UHRY** has unearthed some photos from earlier RMA events. This one is of RMAers on one of **ARTHUR STAMPLEMAN's** fascinating tours of the sculpture garden at Pepsi headquarters in Purchase, NY (2023). TODAY'S SPEAKER

BOB MEANEY introduced DAVID MICHONSKI, who gave us an "Update on the Amazing Last 18 Months of Greenwich Real Estate." DAVID last spoke to the RMA in July 2022. He started by reviewing the market in 2023, then compared the Greenwich market to the national real estate market, and ending with what he termed some "Real Estate News Bites." In 2023 the average price for a Greenwich single family home hit a record \$3,290,012 (after adjusting for the \$139 million sale of "Copper Beech Farm" on Mead Point which skewed the number even higher). Similarly, the median price was up 2%, also

a new record for a single-family home. However, he noted that the number of units sold dropped to 526, a far cry from the 1,000 homes sold in 2021.

For condos and co-ops, the average price rose 2% to a new all-time high of \$1,152,000 while the median price also jumped up 6% to \$875,000. Condo and co-op unit sales did not drop as much as single family, but still declined from the record of 275 in 2021 to 179 last year.



DAVID showed how the 8% rise in single family homes resulted in a return on equity invested in a single-family Greenwich home of 40%. He calculated that by taking the typical transaction with 20% down for the average priced property in 2022 of \$3,050,000, which would have required a \$610,000 down payment (the "equity"), and assume it was financed with an 80% mortgage, the rise of 8% in 2020 means that the home's equity rose by \$244,005, which when

divided into the equity invested results in a 40% gain in one year, a phenomenal return on any investment. Despite the remarkable gains for Greenwich, the national figures turned out to be even better. Comparing the median prices for Greenwich with the median prices nationally during that four-year period, the median price for a single-family home in Greenwich rose 38%, but the national median price rose by 44%, beating Greenwich by six points.

Condo and co-op median prices for the four-year period fared even better. In Greenwich the median price was up 27%, but nationally it was up 40%, a difference of 13%. The results were extraordinary wealth creation during that four-year period.

He then noted that 68% of Americans owned or lived in a household where the heads of household owned the home. This meant that this astounding increase in wealth was spread over two-thirds of the population, helping to fuel the rise in inflation from 2022 to

2023. That meant 224 million out of 330 million Americans became richer during this period, far outpacing the rise in milk, bread and other staples. David was quick to point out that the rise was not enjoyed by all Americans. Specifically, he cited the poor, college graduates with large student debt, and renters, who saw their rents rise rapidly during this period.

He finished his talk by taking us back to 2020 and reminding everyone of how desperate both the public and our political elite became by March of 2020 when inflation turned into deflation and threatened a worldwide depression or at least a severe recession. That prompted then President Trump to declare a national emergency on Friday the 13th of March 2020 followed by passage of the \$1 trillion Cares Act. By May 9, 2020 the US was at 15% unemployment, the highest since the Great Depression. One year later President Biden signed the American Rescue Act for \$1.9 trillion. There was extraordinary spending by the federal government, but David noted that in addition to this stimulus home prices left Americans feeling good about the equity in their home and about getting vaccinated. We felt more comfortable going out and spending more, prompting inflation's rise.

While the Fed attempted to cure inflation by a record rise in the federal funds rate to 5.5% today, up from 0.25 % in 2020, home prices never dropped, fueled by the stimulus both Presidents provided and by potential sellers unwilling to put their properties on the market because they were locked into super low 3.5% mortgages that were available for more than two years.

DAVID concluded that the outlook for a continued rise in home prices depended on the time frame. Long term he noted that rising home prices are likely because the US has suffered an acute housing shortage from 2009 to the present day of between five to six million units and that we are only building about 1.5 million units per year. It would take three years of building three million units per year, which is highly unlikely, just to get us back to normal. He also noted that Millennials were at the peak of their "first time homebuyer range," but restrictive zoning in many towns and an attitude of "not in my backyard" will continue to hinder building the number of homes needed by our population growth.

He finished by noting that in the short term (two years) prices could stall or even fall slightly. Why? Because the pandemic relocation frenzy of people leaving cities to work remotely had decreased for the last three months and employers are far less friendly today toward flexible work from home. He also noted that 2023 saw home prices increase in only three of the 12 months and in October home prices actually declined by 4.1%, suggesting a pause was underway. Lawrence Yun, the chief economist for the National Association of Realtors, has said that "the rapid three-year rise is unsustainable."

DAVID's talk was followed by a lively question & answer session, covering such topics as the prevalence of money laundering in real estate, agent commissions and the recent class-action lawsuit to bring them down, and off-market sales. A more detailed summary of the talk can be found here:
