SPEAKERS PROGRAM

BOB RIMMER previewed today's speaker, MIKE ABRAHAMS, who will speak on "Major Bridges in North America—Design and Construction Challenges." MIKE is a graduate of Bowdoin College and Columbia Engineering School. MIKE and his wife Elena, a retired teacher in the Greenwich school system, live in Old Greenwich. TIM BROOKS announced that next week's speaker is Dr. Peter Muir, who will both perform and speak on "Pioneers of Ragtime." This will be a virtuoso exploration of the toe-tapping piano style that emerged a hundred years ago and gave rise to music such as blues and jazz. It should be lively and entertaining!

HUMAN INTEREST

STEVE BOIES and **BOB BISHOP** spoke about the Greenwich Book Swap, aka "the Dump." **STEVE** explained that a few weeks ago, **JACK** approached him and **BOB** and asked them to do a human-interest story about The Book Swap. After 13 years working at The Swap, I am now emeritus. **BOB** still works at The Swap and often opens, as he does here every Wednesday.

If you are not familiar with The Book Swap, it is located in those two red sheds behind you when you are unloading your recyclables and tossing your trash in the bins at Holly Hill, which most of us still refer to as "The Dump." To get in, you are required to have a dump permit hanging in your rear-view mirror, but all the books there are yours for the taking, limited to 10 books each time you come, unless you are a teacher. The Book Swap is open from 8:00 am to 12:00 noon on Fridays and Saturdays. In addition to books, it accepts, and has available for the taking, LPs, CDs, DVDs and loads of "Cookbooks" and "Coffee Table" books.

It does not accept encyclopedias, textbooks, self-help books, financial books or religious books. If you want to get rid of any of these books, or any books, you can drop them into the blue bins of Discovery Books on any day The Dump is open. The Book Swap was started at the former Greenwich High School, around 1970 by two guys who obviously loved books and were interested in re-cycling. **STEVE** provided a picture of Doug Francefort, who many will

remember. When the old Greenwich High School was converted to our current Town Hall, they moved their operation to "The Dump."

Those were the days when a Townie like Doug could ask a Townie like "Zip" Roddy, the Head of Public Works, to do him a favor and build the two sheds down at Holly Hill. One shed contains our Library and the other contains our inventory for restocking shelves and for staying out of the elements. Doug continued to run The Book Swap until he died in 2020, getting grouchier with each passing year.

In 2009, when I started volunteering at The Book Swap, all of us volunteers were members of the RMA. Working conditions were far from ideal. We had no heat, no electricity and we froze in the winter. And we had nothing to keep off the rain when we took in the books that were dropped off on rainy days. Filling boxes full of our rejects and stacking them in a container was hard work. People who did not know us thought we were Town employees. And people who did know us were surprised to see us working there. But we all loved doing it. And everyone appreciated what we were doing.

There was a time when the Town threatened to close The Book Swap. The then manager of Holly Hill and the head of Public Works thought our patrons were impeding the flow of traffic and were likely to cause accidents. I will admit I saw a few close calls, but I never saw a single fender bender in all the years I worked at The Book Swap. Things changed when Patrick Collins was put in charge of operations at Holly Hill. Patrick is a great guy and is a big supporter of the Book Swap. He provided us with a Port-A-Potty!

Lorrie Stapleton started volunteering at The Book Swap in 2015. Lorrie had taken early retirement from a high-pressure tech job at Barclay's Bank in lower Manhattan and was looking for something to do. And she had a mission. Lorrie has not only improved the working conditions for the volunteers, but she has also turned The Book Swap into a profitable non-profit.

When I started, Doug had a company in Massachusetts periodically pick up the books we had no use for. But along the way, we lost that outlet, and we started tossing all our rejects into a city carting bin that the Town had to pay to have

hauled away. Lorrie found "Discovery Books" which for some years now has come once a week to haul away all our unwanted books. And they pay us \$0.02 per pound. Per Lorrie's Excel worksheet, in 2023 alone, Discovery Books hauled away 67 tons of books saving the Town a lot of money. Lorrie has used this income to significantly improve the working conditions for volunteers. They now have a generator for lighting, a decent heater and two canopies, so volunteers do not have to stand in the rain and snow when people drop off books in bad weather. But more importantly, in 2015, Lorrie started Books4Everyone.org. Her goal was to find a home for all the clean used books The Book Swap can't use. Since then, Lorrie and her helpers have distributed over 250,000 books to more than 30 schools and organizations in Greenwich, Stamford, Norwalk and Bridgeport. Lorrie now has a roster of 14 volunteers who work at The Book Swap, many of whom are women. This list includes Bob and Ed Parker and his wife Debbie who are regular volunteers at The Book Swap.

Before we close, we need to salute **GERHARD PETER** who has been distributing books from The Book Swap to Senior Centers in Greenwich since the beginning of time. If you are interested in learning more about The Book Swap, you will find a small pile of brochures on the table at the back.

TODAY'S SPEAKER

BOB RIMMER introduced today's speaker, **MIKE ABRAHAMS. MIKE** is the former chief structural engineer for WSP, USA Inc., formerly Parsons



Bridge in NY.

Brinckerhoff, an American multinational engineering and design firm. He described his experience in the design and construction of several major bridges including Fremont Bridge, Portland; the Coleman Bridge, VA; Ford Island Bridge, Hawaii; Lions Gate Bridge, British Columbia; Cooper River Bridge, South Carolina; and Kosciuszko

The Fremont Bridge in Portland has a center span where the rib of the arch is above the deck, and is 902 feet (275 m) long. It was fabricated in California then assembled in Oregon. After assembly it was floated on a barge for a 1.7-mile trip to the construction site. On March 16, 1973, the 6,000 short tons steel arch span was lifted 170 ft using thirty-two hydraulic jacks. At the time,

it was listed in the *Guinness Book of World Records* as the heaviest lift ever completed. The Cooper River bridge was the longest cable bridge at the time it was built with a main span of 1,546 feet. Today it is the third longest among cable-stayed bridges in the Western Hemisphere. The Kosciuszko Bridge, originally built in 1938, is one of the most central pieces of NYC infrastructure. It is the hyphen in the Brooklyn-Queens expressway that connects two boroughs over Newtown Creek, a 3.5-mile creek which empties into the East River. A new Kosciuszko bridge had two phases. The East bound bridge opened in 2016 and the West bound in 2019.

MIKE also spoke about leading failure investigations when a bridge collapses, such as the Mianus River bridge which fell when connecting pins failed. He discussed the long history of cranes in the building of bridge spans, including the Fremont bridge.
