Walkers and Talkers report by JEFF JUNKER. "On Thursday, June 13, seven walkers & talkers met at 9 am in the Cos Cob Library parking lot to explore Cos Cob. We started up a path along Strickland Brook that connects the library with the Cos Cob Elementary School and then crossed Route 1 to go down Mead Avenue which has a

number of Victorian houses on either side of the road. At the end of Mead Avenue we went to the left up River Road past the 'Squash House,' looking for the public access path to the boardwalk along the Mianus River. We stopped to read the Greenwich History sign which gave highlights of settlement of the area, and then followed the boardwalk south passing the River Club and a number of marinas until the walkway dead-ended at the I-95 overpass. We returned to River Road to go under I-95 and across the bridge over the Strickland Mill Pond dam. Then turned left to go under the next section of the I-95 overpass and visit the quarter acre Cos Cob Veteran's Memorial Park which is surrounded by the parking area of the town marina on River Road. We continued under the railroad overpass and then made a left into the entrance of Cos Cob Park where we rested under the pagoda next to the soccer field while reviewing the wall mounted plaques depicting the old coalfired Cos Cob power plant which supplied 'the juice' for the first alternating current electric railroad in America. We then went up the mound to the 9-11 memorial, took a quick picture of group with a backdrop of the panoramic view of Long Island Sound, and then backtracked to the railroad underpass. We checked out the 1880's Cos Cob railroad station (unfortunately locked-up) and wandered up several residential roads to arrive at the old cemetery on

Strickland Road (the second oldest cemetery in Greenwich) and then crossed Route 1 to the Cos Cob firehouse, where we noted that the information on another 'History sign' put up for the town's 350th anniversary did not match several dates on the first sign that we encountered. Then it was up the path along Strickland Brook to the library parking lot to finish our 3.1 mile walk in just under two hours."

The meeting was adjourned by 10:18.

Today's Speaker



BOB RIMMER introduced our lecturer Larry Kantor, an economist whose career work has included The Federal Reserve Board, Managing Director at Barclays, a hedge fund, TV appearances and more. Kantor noted that after the Federal Reserve raised interest rates from the 0% to 5.25% between March 2022 and July

2023 to combat high inflation, a recession was widely anticipated. However, the economy defied expectations by accelerating, growing over 4% in the second half of 2023. Inflation declined to the federal 2% target during that period.

The combination of explosive demand and constricted supply caused goods price inflation to spike to a 40 year high. As the impact of Covid faded, goods demand declined, and supply chains healed allowing goods price inflation to plummet. However, services inflation then became high to around 4 to 5%. The historic, smart government stimulus of \$5 trillion enabled the USA to rebound. Remember in early 2020, unemployment went from 3.5% to 15% in two months. Job openings soared to 12 million while the normal number is seven million. Part of this was due to a labor shortage. During Covid about one million residents died, which included 500,000 workers. Many baby boomers also retired, some enticed by buyouts.

The infusion of dollars into businesses and households saved the country from recession. Looking ahead, Kantor expects economic normalization in 2024. Growth should slow to 2 to 2.5% as the labor market cools and excess household savings get diminished. Inflation will settle in the 3 to 4% range which is above the feds 2% target but not out of control. He foresees the fed tolerating this modestly higher inflation range if it proves relatively stable. One or two 1/4 % rate cuts may occur later this year. While falling short of the ultra-low inflation and interest rates seen pre-Covid, he argues the economic environment has fundamentally shifted from that period. He cites factors like increased protectionism, re-shoring of production and more domestic focus on supply chain resilience as catalysts pushing inflation and interest rate structurally higher versus 2010 to 2019 levels.

On broader issues, Kantor expressed concern over the rising income equality in America creating social instability. The tech boom minted enormous wealth at the very top income tier. However, policies like the expanded child tax credit temporarily reduced inequality during Covid until expiring.

He admitted the border is a mess but advocated for higher legal immigration levels to alleviate worker shortages and sustaining economic growth as baby boomers retire and birth rates decline below population maintenance levels. The birth rate is now 1.69 and to maintain the population, it must rise to 2.1 per pregnable female. He acknowledged climate change is a significant, long-term economic threat, likely to display populations, disrupt supply chains and impose substantial recovery/rebuilding costs going forward.

He also said,

- 1. Increased tariffs cause an increase in inflation but do protect some jobs.
 - 2. There is no sign of inflation in sight.
- 3. He sees US Treasury Bonds yielding 4 to 5.5% while stocks are fairly priced.
 - 4. The USA has by far the largest economy in the world.
- 5. Our stable dollar will stay the dominate currency in the world for at least sixty years.
 - 6. There is a risk the hyped-up AI bubble may eventually burst.
- 7. USA excellence in the world financial markets is due to our tech domination.
- 8. The deficit, which was 27% of GDP during WW II, 10% in the financial crisis, 15% in 2020, and 13% in 2021, is now 6%. The deficit should be addressed rather than leaving it to others.
