Walkers and Talkers report by JEFF JUNKER, "Last Thursday, the RMA walkers & talkers met at the 'red barn' entrance to Mianus park at the end of Merrybrook Road on the Stamford/Greenwich line. Seven walkers started south on the river trail only to find several steep grades and a lot more 'trip hazard' roots sticking up in the trail than I

remembered. Also climbing up away from the river took us away from its

cooling effects. So, we turned back and let **GEORGE WARNOCK** take the lead in guiding the group along old woods roads and flatter trails that stayed close to the Mianus river. The photo shows the group determining which trail to take at an intersection about a mile into the park. After about an hour and a half in the heat, we decided it was time to return to our cars. Though shorter than most walks at 2.6 miles, it was a good day overall.

TODAY'S SPEAKER

HORST TEBBE introduced today's speaker, Alexis Voulgaris, moderator of the Greenwich Representative Town Meeting (RTM), speaking on the topic "Greenwich Representative Town Meeting (RTM): A Unique Form of Local



Government." Alexis has been a member of the RTM since 2005. She is the representative from District 6, and prior to that a licensed social worker. Alexis thanked RMA for the invitation and acknowledged the assistance of **HORST**, book swappers at Book Swap, and several members of RMA. She then provided an insightful

presentation on this distinctive form of local government. The RTM, established in 1933, serves as Greenwich's legislative body, comprising 230 members across 12 districts.

She first looked at the RTM's historical context and structure. The RTM emerged from the New England town meeting tradition, transitioning from an open-to-all system to a representative one due to the growing population. This change aimed to maintain fair representation while adapting to demographic shifts. The concept was carefully studied before implementation in Greenwich, with a committee appointed in 1931 to analyze its feasibility. The first RTM election in 1933 saw high engagement, a trend that has continued to the present day. In 2023, over 300 candidates vied for 230 seats, demonstrating sustained community interest in local governance.

The RTM holds significant responsibilities. It approves expenditures over \$5,000, reviews and approves the town budget, passes ordinances, and acts as the final planning authority on municipal improvements. While nonpartisan, the RTM is not apolitical. Recent terms have seen a slight shift towards a center-left orientation, mirroring changes in the town's voter demographics.

Voulgaris highlighted the RTM's large size as a key strength, allowing for diverse representation and opinions. Greenwich's 230-member RTM is significantly larger than those of neighboring towns, enabling broader community participation in local government. Recent notable actions by the RTM include approving a \$501 million town budget, passing a noise ordinance banning gas-powered leaf blowers in summer, and approving funding for a road safety study. The RTM demonstrated remarkable adaptability during the Covid-19 pandemic, never missed a scheduled meeting and quickly transitioned to virtual and hybrid formats. This required significant technological upgrades and procedural adaptations.

Voulgaris discussed several challenges facing the RTM and local government. These include an increase in citizen-initiated ordinances, the need to balance diverse opinions while maintaining civil discourse, and ongoing debates over perennial issues, such as sidewalk construction. She also noted the RTM's role in addressing contemporary concerns, like the recent leaf blower ordinance and potential future discussions on electric bicycles and scooters.

The presentation clarified the RTM's relationship with other governmental entities. These include the Board of Estimate and Taxation (BET). The RTM can approve or reduce, but not increase, budget amounts proposed by the BET. Regarding the Board of Education, the RTM approves a total sum for operations but cannot direct specific allocations within that sum. It has more control over capital expenditures for education. The RTM operates with a modest budget of about \$60,000, with a significant portion allocated to technical costs for hybrid meetings. The Town Clerk's office serves as staff for the RTM, handling administrative tasks.

Throughout her presentation, Voulgaris emphasized the importance of civic engagement and the unique opportunity the RTM provides for residents to participate in local government. She encouraged attendees to follow the RTM's work and consider running for seats in their districts.

Q&A Highlights

Q: What percentage of registered voters do the 230 RTM members represent? How do RTM members prepare for debates with many speakers? A: Voulgaris explained that the 230-member count is fixed, but distribution among districts can change based on the number of electors. She mentioned that RTM members receive comments through a "contact all 230" button on the website. She also described the committee structure, where issues are vetted by various committees before full RTM meetings, allowing members to prepare based on committee reports and recommendations.

Q: What's the process for approving capital spending for something like resurfacing pickleball courts?

A: Voulgaris outlined the process, starting with the Parks and Recreation Department recognizing public interest. The project would need to be added to the Capital Improvement Plan queue. It would then go through the Board of Estimate and Taxation (BET) for approval before coming to the RTM. She emphasized that the process starts with the relevant department and needs to be in a queue for consideration.

Q: Are you considering redistricting, given the size differences between districts?

A: Voulgaris stated she's not considering redistricting, as the current 12 districts work well and represent all sections of town. She explained that the number of delegates per district is based on the number of electors, which can change, but the total of 230 members remains constant.

Q: Is the RTM considering any ordinances regarding electric bicycles, scooters, and lithium battery risks?

A: Voulgaris said she wasn't aware of any current proposals but explained that it only takes 20 interested residents to put an item on the RTM call. She suggested that while it's not currently being considered, it could potentially come up in the future if enough residents express interest.

Q: Is there any discussion about increasing the \$5,000 threshold for expenditures that require RTM approval?

A: Voulgaris mentioned that in 2018-2019, a committee she chaired considered increasing the threshold to \$25,000. However, they decided against proposing this change due to concerns about smaller departments for which \$25,000 would be a significant amount. She noted that for smaller amounts, the RTM uses a Consent Calendar to streamline approvals without debate.

Q: Do Democrats and Republicans on the RTM have separate meetings to determine their positions on issues?

A: Voulgaris emphasized that the RTM is nonpartisan. Members don't typically caucus based on party affiliation. She noted that the large size of the RTM (230 members) makes it difficult for special interest groups to drive decisions, contributing to a more collegial workplace.

Q: Who should be called to enforce the new leaf blower regulations? A: Voulgaris advised calling the police non-emergency number for leaf blower noise complaints. She noted that until Memorial Day 2025, there would be no penalties issued, only warnings, as part of a grace period built into the ordinance.

Q: Is there any way to address the issue of neighborhoods being "wrapped" by utility cables?

A: Voulgaris admitted she didn't have enough information about this issue. She suggested it might be outside the scope of town departments if it involves private companies like Optimum or Frontier, and apologized for not having a more specific answer.
