SPEAKER PROGRAM

STEVE BOIES, acting as program moderator and presenter, introduced Evan Osnos, a Greenwich High School graduate in 1994, now a staff writer for The New Yorker magazine. Evan's book, "Age of Ambition – Chasing Fortune, Truth and Faith in the New China" won the National Book Award for non-fiction in 2014. He mentioned that he has viewed some of our RMA talks. Using an interview format, STEVE posed questions to Evan under the theme, *The Future of U.S. and China Relations*. The following is an encapsulation of the wide-ranging discussion that transpired. Evan began his career with a West Virginia newspaper but honed his craft as a foreign correspondent for the Chicago Tribune during the Iraq war and throughout the Middle East. He moved to Beijing, China in 2005, studied Mandarin, and subsequently joined the staff of The New Yorker. Living for many years in a State-approved compound for journalists and foreigners, he learned a lot about China from his native Chinese neighbors, and met his future wife, an American. He and his family now live in the US, but he travels to China frequently.

The Chinese economy today is 24 times as large as it was 25 years ago, largely due to introduction of a modified market-based economy, while maintaining a rigid political system under the Chinese Communist Party. With more Christians living in China than Communist Party members it creates some tension. Pronouncements from our Administration seem to be at times contradictory: Trump admiring and claiming friendship with Deng Xiaoping, leader of the People's Republic of China, while Secretary of State Pompeo tries to appeal to the people of China ("We are friends.") with an eye toward influencing a move away from the Communist Party and toward democracy. But most Chinese are not ready for such a major change, according to Evan. Ping, on the other hand, is of the opinion that the US is not as stable or prosperous as most would believe, and refers to Trump as a "paper tiger," creating opportunities for China to gain more influence in world affairs by filling voids created by the US (leaving the WHO and other international bodies and treaties). Evan believes that Trump's America-first isolation posture is in sharp contrast with what he suggests Biden's approach

would be, namely improved relations with China and drawing on alliances with other friendly countries and regions to deal jointly with threats from the regime.

China has 55 different ethnic minorities. Among the ethnic-religious conflicts that exist in China, one of the most visible and prominent involves the Uighur (or Uygur), a Turkic-speaking Muslim sect numbering about 30 million who live for the most part in northwestern China, in the Uygur Autonomous Region of Xinjiang. Evan opines that the reason for the government's suppression and mistreatment of those people stems from the policy that there must be only "One uniform China" and that if the Uighurs succeed in their attempt at independence it will create a domino effect with other minorities. China effectively still lives in a pre-civil rights world where multi-cultural co-existence is unacceptable.

What about Hong Kong, given the recent upheaval imposed by the Chinese Government's new law to stamp out opposition to the Communist Party? Some companies will leave, some will stay, but it is no longer a political and legal "safe house" independent from China. Beneficiaries will be places like London, Tokyo, and Singapore. Then there is the perennial conflict between Taiwan and mainland China, which, according to Evan, has become more perilous, with the US and Japan caught in the middle. Would the latter countries intervene if military aggression by China materializes? "I do not know," but foreign policy strategists are recommending that the US should make it clear that we would defend Taiwan.

Who can forget the covid story? A large population still shops at the "wet markets," part of the culture and tradition of the Chinese people. However, changes are expected to be made on how they operate and what they carry.

There were several questions from the audience which elicited the following information from Evan. China dominates the world market for rare earths, essential for electronics and other industries. However, they will not restrict our access since they rely more on the US than vice versa for many important materials and technology. When asked about Tibet, he strongly recommended a recent book that deals in depth with the situation: "Eat the Buddha: Life and Death in a Tibetan Town" by Barbara Demick (Random House, New York, 2020). Although China restricts our social media (Facebook, etc.), he does not think we should reciprocate as it could be counterproductive. In 2019 there were about 370,000 students from China attending our schools, which helps those institutions financially. However, the number is declining as many parents are uneasy about sending their children to the US and are opting for London and Australia, e.g.
