

Dennis Corcoran Author of

"Induction Day at Cooperstown: A History of the Baseball Hall of Fame Ceremony"



Almost every year since 1939, baseball's most outstanding players, umpires, pioneers and executives have been enshrined at Cooperstown in a public ceremony attracting thousands of fans from across the United States. Hall of Fame membership, the game's highest honor, is conferred by the Baseball Writers Association of America, the Veterans Committee, and in the case of 17 Negro League greats in 2006, an ad hoc committee of historians.

Teacher, author, historian, and baseball fan, Dennis Corcoran will talk about the origins and history of the Hall of Fame museum and its election process. He will discuss how the ceremony on induction day has evolved since 1939 and will highlight four of the most impressive speeches by honorees inducted into the Hall of Fame. He will also tell us stories about

the fans, including a former president, and how their enthusiasms have become an integral part of the ceremony. Over 80,000 attended the induction of Cal Ripken, Jr. and Tony Gwynn in 2007.

A graduate of Villanova University and the John Jay School of Criminal Justice, Mr. Corcoran taught social studies for thirty years in the Hendrick Hudson School District. In addition to his book, *Induction Day at Cooperstown*, he has written a history titled *Pleasantville--300 Years--From Manor to Suburb*. He has also researched and developed presentations on *The Benedict Arnold and John Andre Conspiracy* and *Baseball Discrimination*, the latter inspired by the story of Jackie Robinson.

Mr. Corcoran lives in Pleasantville, N Y. and has a monthly blog, *I left my Heart in Cooperstown*.
